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1	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Pledge of
2	Allegiance and then a moment of silence, please.
3	ALL: I pledge allegiance to the flag
4	of The United States of America and to the
5	republic for which it stands; one nation under
6	God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for
7	all.
8	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: A moment of silence
9	for Jose Santiago, our police officer. Thank you
10	very much.
11	Welcome everyone to our Thursday, April
12	10th, 7:00 meeting. Let's see, I believe it's a
13	moment of silence. Opportunity for public
14	comment on agenda items, if anybody has anything.
15	VINNIE: One point on Resolution Number
16	3, the plans for upstairs. Is there a plan? Is
17	there something going on the upstairs that we
18	should know about?
19	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, the we are
20	investigating that the idea that if it's
21	habitable, that we are thinking of creating a
22	rental area, that we could rent it out to the
23	professional
24	VINNIE: Like I said (indiscernible)
2 5	throwing some stuff out of the window the other

1 day.

2	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah. Yeah, we're
3	cleaning it because there's a lot of stuff up
4	here, or up there since they probably moved in.
5	So, we went through, we had a we separated a
6	lot of stuff. We went through Christine, the
7	Department heads and went through a pile of stuff
8	that was still damaged from the flood that was
9	still upstairs. We went through a lot of
10	documents. We saved a lot of stuff, and other
11	things that were that could be disposed of, we
12	shredded, and this was just a clean-up of the
13	empty boxes and things that were really not
14	usable because of water, and other issues.
15	VINNIE: Got you. Resolution Number 4,
16	\$14,000 for the additional pickleball courts for
17	pavement.

- MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yep.
- VINNIE: Was that budgeted?
- 20 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: That's coming out
- 21 of our --
- DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO:
- 23 Recreation --
- MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- recreation fund.
- 25 We still have, I think we're up to, I think

1 \$75,000 in that account. 75 or 85, in that 2 neighborhood. 3 Can you take any of that money VINNIE: 4 and put it towards Woodfield at all or? 5 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, we are. 6 We're actually looking at that now for, which is 7 further down, so for the skateboard park, well, 8 we're waiting for actually the final kind of 9 They came out and walked it with Susan proposal. 10 and we're trying to figure that out. And then 11 potentially, the other half we could, potentially 12 do ourselves, and have a basketball court 13 situation. 14 The solicitor permits that we VINNIE: 15 have getting approved for this meeting on these 16 resolutions, on 7 and 8. 17 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yes. 18 Is this so they can drive VINNIE: 19 around the Village and sell things, or is this 20 for community events? 21 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: No, this is more 22 for Sewell Park. We've been talking to vendors, 23 and they have been actually asking if they could 24 set themselves up in a more of a semi-permanent

situation from say spring, May to October.

1	VINNIE: And we're only going to charge
2	\$100 a week to sit at Sewell Park?
3	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: To start, yes.
4	Yeah. And see, because if we can get three or
5	four vendors down there, then we'll collect that
6	money and we'll turn that money into the park
7	development which is
8	VINNIE: It is very inexpensive.
9	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, we're not
10	VINNIE: on real estate right off
11	Main Street.
12	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: I get it. But this
13	is something that's brand new too, summer times
14	are normally slower and
15	VINNIE: Summer times are slower?
16	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: if we need to
17	VINNIE: You said summer times are
18	slower?
19	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Slower, yeah.
20	VINNIE: For business
21	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: for those people -
22	- business?
23	VINNIE: Because more people are going
24	to be outside and walking by in town
25	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: If they're around.

- Most people are on vacation mode, they're -- most of them, if you drive around here now, compared to what you'll see in June and July, there is a significant difference in traffic. So, you know, we don't want to bang them over the head too much, too fast, I guess, and we all kind of felt
- 8 VINNIE: Cost of doing business.

that \$100, \$400 a month is --

- MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- not that bad.

 And it depends, you know, people coming down
 there to buy their stuff, and it's going to take
 a little while, I think to gear that up, we want
 to advertise it. But to do something down there,
 as well as potentially, at Vernon Allen Park for
 the amount of pickleball players we have over
 there, we're looking at potentially an ice cream
 guy. We have somebody who does shakes. She's
 interested in putting her trailer out there and
 basically trying to do the same thing to take
 care of the people that are playing and also give
 us some revenue.
- VINNIE: And Resolution 09. This application fee, was it always the \$25 fee or is that something new?
- MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: That's new. And

- that would be for anyone who is applying for a
 race, a walk, and that'll be part of the fee.
- VINNIE: \$25, I have the block and offroad, sometimes occupying parks that --
- 5 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: The -- we feel the 6 fee for that --
- 7 | VINNIE: Why not --
- MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- will not ever get close to what we're spending. Right? So, --
- VINNIE: Why are we charging it,
- 11 though?

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- MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- we're going to get something.
- VINNIE: Might as well just be free.

 15 You know?

MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: And we have that ability to do that, depending on who they are. Right? So, that was our discussion in the fall, and you know we went and banged them for \$200, \$300, that's \$300 bucks that they're either going to have to raise their prices to raise the money that they want to donate to the food pantry or to the animal shelter. You know, and I feel like at that cost, we're impeding in them trying to do the good thing, and we're trying to be, I don't

1 know, a little strong handed, I think in just 2 trying to get \$200 or \$300 when we're probably 3 spending, you know, a little bit more substantial for that. But again, from the police budget and our overtime budget that we have in VPW, the 5 6 Chief does a great job in managing all of that 7 and it's budgeted. So, you know -- I think the 8 good thing for this Village -- you know, we are, 9 now, I want to say on the map. People have 10 recognized this place. They come here from all 11 over. 12 VINNIE: Hence wise, you should charge 13 more. 14 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, but --15 You know, that was my point --VINNIE: 16 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- I get your 17 point. And you know what, if it takes off, you 18 know what, we can always increase things. That's 19 -- it's not \$100 forever, and it could be more 20 than \$25. You know, we're just looking at a 21 starting point. We don't want to chase the 22 people away who enjoy coming here to do their

activities, because they could probably go

anywhere.

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Yeah.

1 VINNIE: Resolution 14, the very day we 2 came --3 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah it is 4 (indiscernible). 5 VINNIE: As I read this, you know, 6 who's in charge of \$3,000 paid from recreations? 7 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay, so --8 TRUSTEE STEVE PRESSER: New business --9 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: --business. We 10 called that out before the meeting actually 11 stated. So, to be on 14, to clarify that, all 12 right, the recreation fee is for new 13 construction. The way it's been forever. 14 There's always been a fee. We're just increasing 15 it to \$310. 16 VINNIE: Okay. 17 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: So, it's a new 18 home, a new development, the developer will have 19 a --20 VINNIE: Well (indiscernible) on the 21 unit, so it was like a townhouse or a condo --22 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right, it's three 23 grand a unit. 24 VINNIE: So, if it's a multi-unit 25 resident --

1	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: If it the things
2	that we've depending on what's coming down, we
3	need to have that conversation because, say
4	somebody, this comes down and I mean, the type of
5	business, say it's outpatient services and it's a
6	building. You know, how are we going to look at
7	that, per se.
8	VINNIE: What does the law say now?
9	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: It's basically per
10	unit and a home.
11	VINNIE: And it's \$3,000 now, or is
12	this
13	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: No, it's 15.
14	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Per
15	dwelling unit, I believe, right now.
16	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Per dwelling unit,
17	and this is just increasing it 15. And we did
18	our we did a soft survey, every because
19	there was some people paying, some towns are
20	charging more than that. We feel, based on the
21	normal development we would, you know, have
22	enough funds to carry this part through
23	maintenance wise and keep the equipment updated
24	for a bunch of years moving forward.
25	VINNIE: Besides (indiscernible).

1	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: The other
2	piece of that is they're also paying water, sewer
3	hookup fees, and other fees.
4	VINNIE: Yeah.
5	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO:
6	Cumulative, I think the only one that was higher
7	than the \$3,000, if I remember correctly was
8	Monroe, at five.
9	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah.
10	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: But they
11	didn't have the municipal
12	VINNIE: Fine.
13	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Okay.
14	VINNIE: It's just the fact I'm just
15	reading the one above that, 13. Speaking of
16	Woodfield Park, I guess they're getting a
17	permanently used park for baseball, correct?
18	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Correct.
19	VINNIE: That is a public park, right?
20	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah.
21	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Yeah.
22	VINNIE: Okay, I went down there with
23	my son at the beginning of March to throw the
24	ball around the baseball diamond and there's a
25	lock on the gate. Is there a reason why that

- 1 | field's locked?
- 2 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: During the winter
- 3 months we lock it. We lock everything down.
- 4 VINNIE: March. The beginning of
- 5 March.
- 6 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well --
- 7 VINNIE: And it's -- I think it's still
- 8 locked, you know, as of the end of March because
- 9 I was throwing my son over the fence.
- 10 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah.
- 11 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: There was a
- 12 | problem with them -- somebody leaving the lights
- 13 on all night.
- 14 VINNIE: What does that have to do with
- 15 residents using the field?
- MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: No, that might have
- 17 been at Mays Field. They don't have any lights
- 18 over there. We'll check that out. I mean, if
- 19 you were out there, you just could have called.
- 20 Sometimes we have an issue with the pickleball
- 21 courts if there's something going on and the
- 22 doors don't get opened right away, some -- they
- 23 | just call, and we'll go down and open it up. But
- 24 it's a public park, it's not --
- 25 | VINNIE: All right, so it shouldn't --

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1	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: It's not closed.
2	VINNIE: Oh, it should be open?
3	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yes.
4	VINNIE: Okay.
5	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: We'll
6	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO:
7	(indiscernible).
8	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: The locks on
9	Woodfield.
10	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Yep.
11	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Thank you.
12	Anything else, Vinnie?
13	VINNIE: Last one, 19. The public
14	hearing, are we going to get a copy of that law,
15	260? The updated law that we're
16	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: For the
17	VINNIE: The Sidewalk Café
18	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Sidewalk Café
19	yeah. We're actually going to start to have a
20	section out there that we can post the
21	VINNIE: New laws.
22	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: new laws, so
23	when we're doing, you can, you know, look at them
24	and what not.
25	VINNIE: I'd like to see more of the

- 1 resolutions. I feel like we're getting closer,
- 2 you know what I mean.
- MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: What do you mean?
- 4 What do you mean closer?
- 5 VINNIE: Susan knows.
- 6 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Well if the
- 7 draft zoning is --
- 8 VINNIE: No, I'm talking the irrigation
- 9 law that we're going to update --
- 10 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Shortly.
- 11 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: That's on there
- 12 too. I mean, they are actually writing it now.
- 13 | Okay?
- 14 VINNIE: No, it's been a year. So --
- MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: No, I know.
- 16 VINNIE: I've been asking.
- 17 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: It's been, you
- 18 know, we tried to find --
- 19 VINNIE: This is one law that will save
- 20 the residents money. You understand that?
- 21 That's one where --
- 22 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: I understand they
- 23 do.
- VINNIE: -- we're spending money, but
- 25 this will save us money.

1	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: They certainly do.
2	You know, the bigger challenge there is going to
3	be the logistics of it, how you hook it up. But
4	that's just something else. If we get the law in
5	place and it's functional, it'll work. We can
6	find, probably a lot of time and these guys are
7	working on a lot of different things, and it just
8	never made it that high in the totem pole and
9	this we wanted to try to get it in place for
10	spring, summer, so that if someone wants to try
11	to do it, they're able to do it.
12	TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Darrel, we have
13	to have specific language in there in the sub
14	VINNIE: The language is out there.
15	People do it already in other towns.
16	TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: I understand,
17	it's not common in this area, though, and we have
18	to have specific language for people who want to
19	try now, just (indiscernible) that to their
20	inside their house, so they're not paying sewer
21	and facility charges on it.
22	VINNIE: Mm hmm, you put two meters.
23	The irrigation meter and look at the
24	difference between two meters and you got your
25	number

1	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Can you take that
2	(indiscernible)?
3	VINNIE: It's real simple.
4	TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: It's not that
5	simple. It's a little bit more to it. We have
6	to make sure backfall meters; backflow stops are
7	installed and everything.
8	VINNIE: That's common. That's not
9	TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: And we have to
10	come up with fines for people who don't obey the
11	laws.
12	VINNIE: And that's very common too.
13	So, that's there's nothing mysterious about
14	the irrigation law and that should have been
15	taken up already.
16	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Did you Vinnie
17	what municipality that you know that has this in
18	place?
19	VINNIE: I'll double check. I think I
20	might have sent it to you, Susan.
21	TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Not in New York
22	you didn't send me one for New York. You sent
23	me one for down south.
24	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Because you I
25	mean, whatever is down south

- 20 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay. So, we'll
- 21 check that out and see. Because if we have
- 22 something to go by, it'll make it a lot easier.
- 23 VINNIE: Yeah.

- 25 engineers over there as well. So, it would be --

1	VINNIE: (indiscernible).
2	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: and I'll
3	actually reach out to them and ask them.
4	VINNIE: Thank you.
5	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Anything else?
6	Paul?
7	PAUL: Paul (indiscernible), Patriot
8	Lane. Going back to Resolution 7 and 8, a couple
9	of questions and then I'll give you all the
10	questions and then you can answer them at the
11	same time. Why do you have a separate resolution
12	for one business and another resolution for the
13	other three? That's number one. Number two,
14	what's the start date of this \$100 a week fee
15	business, and is it every week? And is there an
16	end date to the \$100 a week per business? Can
17	they stop? Can they just not pay a week if
18	they're not showing up? Is there what are
19	are there any other requirements?
20	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: We
21	PAUL: And then, wait a minute, and
22	then do we really want to have all these trucks
23	parked in a burned out I mean, I don't now, it
2.4	kind of looks you guys are wery interested in

how the Village looks. I think a bunch of food

1	trucks looks like the carnival or tacky or I
2	am. And then the next part of it is, is it fair
3	to the brick and mortar business in town that
4	serve food, F&J and is the cheesecake place, but
5	whatever.
6	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah.
7	PAUL: I mean, it pays out of
8	they're paying big bucks
9	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yep.
10	PAUL: to run their business and
11	these guys are going to do 100 bucks. I don't
12	you know, I don't know any of them, I don't
13	really care. But I just think a bunch of food
14	trucks parked around the Village, I think, you
15	know, just think about what it's going to look
16	like.
17	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well.
18	PAUL: And again, go back to my other
19	questions. When is the start date? When is the
20	end date? Is it year-round? And can they stop
21	paying at any time because they don't feel like
22	coming that week or
23	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: I think they
24	PAUL: And does it include driving
25	around?

1	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right. So, we have
2	ice cream, like Godmothers
3	TRUSTEE STEVE PRESSER: Ice Mothers.
4	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Ice
5	Mothers
6	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Ice Mothers
7	sorry Godmothers Ice Mothers that drives
8	around. They have that truck to that. Some of
9	these don't or they can potentially drive it
10	around. Orange County Ice Cream drives it
11	around, but he can also make it permanent, and
12	semi-permanent and leave it. We have Kribley who
13	can do the same thing, and what we're trying to
14	do is get some notoriety at the Sewell Parik as
15	we're working towards developing it and making it
16	the park it needs to be, because that's been on
17	the drawing pad for, oh good lord
18	PAUL: But at times that they were
19	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: since the 11th
20	or 14
21	PAUL: times if there restrictions.
22	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: so all right, so
23	we're talking maybe 11 years that this has been
24	discussed. So, what we were thinking is that to
25	have these food businesses down there would help

attract people to come to the area, enjoy the space, have the picnic tables there. And then potentially on weekends, have some kind of light music in the afternoons and just draw people to our Village. And it's the same concept at Vernon Allen Park, but probably more for the people that are playing pickleball or going to the dog park that could take advantage of an ice cream or something on that side.

You know most of the trucks that we've ever seen or that we're -- that we've done through the event committee or slated by ourselves, the trucks, I think, are -- they're good. I mean, they passed inspections. They have licenses. They also have their Department of Health Certificates for their businesses. So, we just think it's something that brings more people to the Village.

PAUL: Okay, so let's go one by one.

And why they're in two separate resolutions?

MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: No reason at all.

PAUL: Okay. Number two, is there a time -- a time of day limit? 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.? Is there a time of day in the resolution?

MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: No. That used to

- 5 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: We understand that.
- 6 PAUL: All right, so I just wanted -- I
- 7 just wanted to ask --
- 8 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: I know.
- DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: He chose
- 10 to do that.
- 11 PAUL: I just wanted to ask.
- 12 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Okay
- 13 PAUL: And the I quess more for later.
- 14 I'm good for now.
- MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay. Anyone else?
- 16 All right, if not, we will proceed.
- So, for this Sunday, or actually, this
- 18 | Saturday was scheduled the extravaganza over at
- 19 Vernon Allen Park from 12 to 4. That has now
- 20 been rain dated out and it will take place on
- 21 | Sunday, same time, 12 to 4 at that Vernon Allen
- 22 Park.
- 23 DIANE MACK: Is it raining the whole
- 24 weekend?
- DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Yeah.

MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: It's supposed to rain all day tomorrow. It's supposed to rain a good portion of Saturday.

TRUSTEE VERNON COLEMAN: And lighten up on Sunday.

MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: I'm sorry?

7 TRUSTEE VERNON COLEMAN: And lighten up 8 on Sunday.

MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: And lighten up on Sunday. So, hopefully, that happens. For the little league, they're going to make a decision tomorrow to either cancel Saturday, they will not reschedule it. They'll do something small, potentially at Mays Field. So, more to come, and we'll put out an announcement tomorrow if it will be postponed for Saturday.

Frontier cancellation of cable TV franchise. The Village went into a franchise, I believe it was enacted in 2017 because Frontier was getting into TV. I had no idea. So, we ended up receiving a letter from them that they want to get out of that business and they're going -- they've asked us to basically cancel the franchise agreement, which we've had reviewed by our attorneys, and everything is okay there. So,

1 | we'll be cancelling that.

CHRIS: It's not that they asked us to cancel it. They said they have the right to cancel it said they have the right to cancel, they've invoked that right.

TRUSTEE STEVE PRESSER: Correct.

MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, it's on their behalf, not our behalf that we, for the most part, they only had a few customers within Washingtonville. Okay?

Let's see, Village Spring cleanup is
Saturday, April 26th from 9 to 12, being led by
the Kawanis Club. Everybody would be meeting
over at Vernon Allen Park in the parking lot and
then being assigned an area wherever you would
like to potentially clean up. The Village will
be supplying, as always, the bags and some pickup
sticks, and some gloves. So, again, that's the
26th.

Greenlight cabling for Internet installation, we've discussed this a little bit. But we have now met with these guys, and they are, you know, planning in the areas that have overhead, they're going to be running fiber throughout the Village. In areas that are --

Τ	utilities are underground, they will be
2	installing piping, plastic pipe, and fiber
3	underground with a machine, so there'll be no
4	excavations. As they put their plans together
5	and we know what's going on, we will advise the
6	residents of that particular street of a date
7	that they will be coming in with their equipment.
8	They will, if there's anyone damaged from the
9	machine, et cetera, they will be repairing
10	anything that's been damaged. They'll reseed, do
11	everything that they need to do. They are all
12	over Orange County. They are just finishing up
13	the Village of Goshen, and I and they didn't -
14	- I think might be the Montgomery, Walden area.
15	But it's a new Internet service that you'll be
16	able to take advantage of like with Spectrum.
17	So, it'll be something additional to us.
18	One thing that we are talking to them
19	about is potentially giving them a closet-size

about is potentially giving them a closet-size area for this building that we would be able then to get some revenue on rent, because they could house their equipment here for the Village of Washingtonville, and we're, you know, in negotiations, and conversations about that. So, more to come on that.

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1	The banners for the Veterans have been
2	going up and they should be just about complete
3	with the installation, and we have another order,
4	probably six to eight banners that will be going
5	in very shortly. And it looks really great with
6	the American flags, and we did put the flags up a
7	little bit earlier than usual for the funeral of
8	our Police Officer Santiago.
9	Next is the MS-4 reporting. That
10	report was due April 1st. We submitted it prior
11	to 4/1. It will be, if not already, it should be
12	on the website if anybody wants to read it. MS-
13	4, I think it's approximately 800 and something
14	pages.
15	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: If you
16	need some help sleeping at night
17	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: So, if you need to
18	go to sleep early, start reading that. But it's
19	detailed and it was in on time, and it's the most
20	important piece.
21	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO:
22	(indiscernible).
23	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Hmm?
24	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Don't put
25	notes down on the (indiscernible)

MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Don't put notes

(indiscernible) -- let's see, the downtown

Village area, tree project, we've been doing some work down there, laying out where we're going to potentially put these trees. And we're still waiting on the lighting project that still had been out there and we're just waiting for DASNY from New York State to kind of move the process along so we can go out and eventually purchase lights that are similar to what's in E.J. Square. This is -- would be a grant, I think the lighting is somewhere in the neighborhood of \$60,000. It would be 17 light poles installed. So more to come on that.

E.J. Mclaughlin Square, we're planning on next week, weather permitting that we'll be able to recall the two poles that we made bases for in E.J. Square, and then add the decorative Edison lights in the parking lot area, after the wiring has been installed, to kind of keep up the beautification over there, as mentioned, those restaurants in that area are planning on summer time to potentially close the lot and serve dinner in the parking area. And they would also have some kind of potential music, some other

street vendors, and things like that. So, that's moving along nicely and with the warmer weather, hopefully we can get that done.

mentioned at the last meeting or the meeting before, the EVW Sewer plant has a camera. It's up and running. Memorial Park is up and running. We have four cameras over there. Last week, we caught somebody dumping illegally collect grass clippings and shrubs that they ripped out of their yard. So, the gentleman was ticketed and asked to remove all of the garbage that he dumped. So, the cameras caught my eye, and I'm look at this, unbelievable. So, --

DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: We're watching you.

MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yes, the parks are being surveilled. But there's one basically on the Memorial, there's one on the playground.

There's one on the parking lot, and we also have one at the entrance of coming in and out of the parking lot itself. And so far it's working pretty well. So, things are going good there.

We're looking at potentially next step will be E.J. Square, and probably Ahern with the

- 1 activities of having all of the pickleball 2 activity down there, and obviously the dog park, 3 but mostly the pickleball area because someone, at some point over the weekend, had taken one of the doors off of our fence. Not damaged it, 5 6 removed it, put it on the side of the fence for 7 whatever reason. It was on the side of the 8 pickleball area that has not been completed yet, 9 so I'm not quite sure what the motive was behind 10 that. But the camera will be forthcoming on 11 that.
 - Update on the pickleball courts, three courts are to be completed. We have the revolution on this night's agenda. And the goal is, weather permitting, is really our goal -- or is our issue at the moment. We need temperatures, I think they said --

TRUSTEE STEVE PRESSER: Over 50 --

MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- within the 50' and consistent. Our plan is to get that completed by May 17th and the reason for that is that our high school, I think sophomore or junior class wants to do a fundraiser for their class to raise money for, I guess, their proms and whatever else that they do. So, if we can get

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1	those three courts up, we feel that we can keep
2	those three courts on the left active for anybody
3	who wants to play, and then those three courts
4	for four hours would be dedicated to the high
5	school students to do their fundraising. And
6	that's our goal there.
7	We mentioned the basketball court
8	already at Wood Field and more to come on that.
9	Update on the meters. Two meters,
10	basically the local law is in the process of
11	being written, Vinnie, if you can get that town,
12	wherever it is, that would be great.
13	VINNIE: Oh that's what that was, two
14	meters? I didn't know what that was.
15	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Sorry?
16	VINNIE: I didn't know about that, that
17	was
18	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah that's for the
19	mandate. For some reason it said it was going to
20	be continued. But that's what it's about.
21	VINNIE: Oh, all right.
22	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah. The Chief
23	did, we had a couple of complaints about speeding
24	vehicles on North Street. The Chief did a survey

on that and just came back and Chief, do you

1 recall, I know that it was less than one percent 2 of the people that were actually speeding. 3 CHIEF BRIAN ZACCARO: Well it was good. It was basically done for almost a week. 4 5 less than -- there was one percent of people speeding ten miles an hour over, which is usually 6 7 like -- are discretionary. Tony Mottles is speed 8 over there. 9 I'm sorry? MAN 1: 10 CHIEF BRIAN ZACCARO: Tony Mottles will 11 speed over there. No, it's easy for people to 12 complain about speeding cars. When we put the 13 machine there and it gives live data, it's not 14 that we think people are lying, we're just trying 15 to reinforce that, you know, what the facts are. 16 That's all. 17 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah. 18 CHIEF BRIAN ZACCARO: And it was closer 19 to Ferguson where we had the complaint. 20 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right. 21 CHIEF BRIAN ZACCARO: We move it around 22 the Village, so we try not to tell people where 23 it is so that they don't speed on the street.

CHIEF BRIAN ZACCARO: But we'll keep

- 14 VINNIE: Mm hmm.
- DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: It was a
- 16 little bit of a surprise here. Some of them have
- 17 local laws. A lot of them do not have local
- 18 laws. The ones that do have local laws in place,
- 19 maybe half a dozen, not one of them are
- 20 collecting occupancy taxes. Not one. There are
- 21 two that are planning on doing it as of June but
- 22 have not yet.
- 23 Also, the overall consensus was, first
- 24 of all, why? Right? If you're going to have a
- 25 | local law in place to allow short-term rentals,

1	why wouldn't we reap the benefit? They do have
2	permit fees. They range greatly in cost. Some
3	are owner-occupied, some prices change for non-
4	owner-occupied. Some will not allow you to be
5	non-owner occupied and have a short-term rental.
6	That said, most of the feedback was not
7	very positive. The big piece and the takeaway
8	with all of this was enforcement. So, I'm going
9	to use our Village, for example. We have no
10	local law in place, one way or the other.
11	VINNIE: I thought we did.
12	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: We do?
13	WOMAN 1: Oh, it's part of building the
14	
15	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: We are in
16	the process of drafting a local law right now.
17	VINNIE: On short-term rentals, I
18	thought there was sent to all of us, and I
19	brought that up and you
20	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Chris,
21	can you comment?
22	VINNIE: I remember we discussed that,
23	I brought it up, and you guys were going to look
24	into that law, I was still waiting on that. It
25	was signed, sealed, and delivered stamped

continue, and we can circle back to that. Okay?

VINNIE:

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DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Most of them don't have a local law in place allowing or prohibiting short-term rentals. So, in that situation, what happens is, they take place, like what's happening here. We have -- we know that there are short-term rentals available. We're not collecting an occupancy tax, even the municipalities that have a local law in place are not collecting. And so the big question is why?

It comes down to who's enforcing this. Who is -- how are we finding out -- wait, Vinnie. So, when you can go on and look? Right? can go on to Air B&B or Verbo and look. But that we can't -- Building Inspectors cannot knock on So, we have no way of knowing if they're actually being rented, when, or to who. They can say they blocked off a chunk of time for whatever reason. We have no way of enforcing it. We can request and make a local law, as some, Chester, I believe, Goshen is about to, and Cornwall is going to start collecting, June 1st. But now you know, so they have to register at that point. Ιf they don't, I guess, you know, they can issue a fine. And that's --

CHRIS: 6 of 23.

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1	VINNIE: So, the law I sent you for
2	Wyndham, I think.
3	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Okay, you
4	want to know about Wyndham?
5	VINNIE: That was a pretty extensive
6	penalty list that they have.
7	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Yeah, but
8	guess what, they, number one, do not have a local
9	law in place for allowing short-term rentals, and
10	they are not collecting an occupancy tax.
11	VINNIE: But that was a pretty
12	extensive penalties list that they had of
13	violations for short-term rentals.
14	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: But
15	they're not enforcing it, and this is coming
16	right from Wyndham. We made two phone calls to
17	Wyndham because of what you sent over to me.
18	They're not enforcing. They are not saying no.
19	They won't prohibit it, but it's also not fair
20	for us to compare our small village to Wyndham.
21	Wyndham is (indiscernible).
22	VINNIE: Yeah, I was just showing an
23	example of the law that was written
24	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Right.
25	No, I understand.

1 VINNIE: -- for short-term rentals.

2 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: And so we 3 did. You know, I wanted to make sure we were being fair and doing our due diligence. 5 didn't just survey villages or towns, we did a 6 combination. And the big takeaway was, they're 7 not supportive of this. Most municipalities are 8 not for many reasons. Who is enforcing it? 9 BI's cannot do that on weekends and evenings. 10 Right? That's typically when they're being 11 If there's issues and they're not 12 compliant, that becomes a burden on the police 13 department, potentially fire department. I mean, 14 but in all fairness, if our PD gets a call for a 15 noise ordinance, that is whether it's a shortterm rental or it's a resident, if -- it's 16 17 handled the same way. But it's almost impossible 18 to figure out who's actually renting these, 19 making sure they're registered, and so at the end 20 of the day it's not adding up. It will be more 21 of a strain and a burden on our Village than 22 anything else. So, we are actually in the 23 process of drafting some local law to prohibit 24 short-term rentals in the Village.

So, how are you going to

VINNIE:

1 enforce that?

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DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Right. How do we enforce that? So, here's what I've asked -- one of the first questions I asked when we were drafting the local law. The biggest suggestion was to go on to the sites and see if there are any registered. Okay? But then it comes back to how do we prove it? We -- our Building Inspector cannot knock on doors. only way that we can actually take an action is if somehow it is brought to our attention that there is a rental in there. There is a potential issue going on at the time and we find out that But we can't knock on doors. And so I way. quess that's why it's not as popular in areas like ours as it is in areas, you know, vacation spots. Beaches, you know, entertainment spots and so on, resorts. Bill. - 5 (indiscernible) against that.
- 6 VINNIE: So, send a bill in the mail

It's a law. 7 CHRIS: That's not how enforcement 8 works, but --9 VINNIE: Really? 15	we're doing is when we're notified, we're date-
16	stamping it. And when we find the lights are
17	back on, we're date stamping it again, and then
18	we're going to go for the credits. I was just
19	how you were doing it.
20	DIANE MACK: Okay. So, what happened
21	was, there were several lights out on Ahern
22	Boulevard.
23	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Mm hmm.
24	DIANE MACK: It was pitch black.
25	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Mm hmm.

1	DIANE MACK: You know
2	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah.
3	DIANE MACK: in the fall and stuff.
4	Go for a walk, so it was very dangerous.
5	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yep.
6	DIANE MACK: Made the report. Next day
7	I made the report again. I tracked every day
8	that I called them to say that these lights were
9	out. When it didn't happen and I didn't get any
10	response after 30 days, I said, well, there's a
11	lot of lights out in this Village. We pay a lump
12	sum to keep the lights on
13	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right.
14	DIANE MACK: Not to keep them off. I
15	want a credit. They gave us a credit.
16	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay. Like
17	I said, we're pushing the buttons to get that
18	information. We just hadn't found the right
19	person. So,
20	DIANE MACK: Call them every day and
21	get that person's name, and call them every day.
22	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, I have her
23	name, it's Teresa
24	DIANE MACK: They'll get tired.
25	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: she was supposed

- 1 to -- she's like our liaison to O and R. So,
- 2 I've reached out to her, and I said --
- DIANE MACK: Go to billing.
- 4 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- and I'm waiting
- 5 | for her to get back to me, but it's been a little
- 6 frustrated.
- 7 DIANE MACK: Call somebody in billing.
- 8 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Like everything
- 9 else, we try to get with these particular
- 10 vendors.
- 11 VINNIE: Staying on streetlights. Do
- 12 | we need a permit to nail signs into the street
- 13 | lights?
- MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: To nail signs --
- VINNIE: Into street lights
- 16 (indiscernible) business signs.
- 17 TRUSTEE VERNON COLEMAN: What kind of
- 18 | sign are you talking about?
- 19 VINNIE: A sign. Any kind of sign.
- 20 Business sign. Do we need a permit to hammer it
- 21 | into the street lights that are all over the
- 22 | Village. We have a --
- 23 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: If anybody is doing
- 24 | it, to my understanding, they're illegal.
- VINNIE: All right, because -- correct.

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1	We have to
2	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Like if it's a
3	landscaping
4	VINNIE: because we have a building
5	code that says it's illegal.
6	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Vinnie, we just
7	take them down.
8	VINNIE: All right, well there's signs
9	throughout the Village, every year in the spring,
10	pools are opening up, there's pool signs
11	everywhere. If we have the signs, hence mine
12	they were digging up my front lawn yesterday
13	because of all the (indiscernible) they're
14	planning every few years, the wire was broken.
15	All right, but we've got signs throughout the
16	Village. A guy with hammer and nail, he was
17	(indiscernible) post that wires go through.
18	Maybe, you know, we should start fining those
19	guys for free advertising and not getting a
20	permit to hang the signs on the street post like
21	that.
22	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, we would
23	never approve permits

Village and there's pool signs everywhere.

VINNIE: I won't -- drive through the

- 16 another one today that was put into the telecom
- 17 poles.
- MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: All right. We'll
- 19 reach out to RBI.
- VINNIE: Now to bring up the Air B&B's.
- 21 Orange County currently has a five percent
- 22 occupancy (indiscernible) -- how do they --
- DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: They --
- VINNIE: -- enforce it?
- DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: I can't

- answer that. The state has one also. So, I
 can't answer that. It's in place. I mean,
 they're required to register, so if they're
 registered on there --
 - VINNIE: Maybe we could piggy back on them and they, you know, they can reimburse maybe we tack on a percentage to them. I don't know, maybe reach out to our legislator, and find out maybe he can work with Orange County and put our tax on them, through them. Like we did reimburse with sales tax. Right? That comes from the state and county. County tax comes back to us. Correct?
- 14 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: It does.
- VINNIE: Maybe we can work that way

 with occupancy tax. If they're already doing it,

 that's an option.

8	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: at the dump.
9	PAUL: Do we invoice them?
10	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: We will be, yeah.
11	PAUL: How much are we charging them?
12	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Same amount.
13	PAUL: Just \$20 per thousand.
14	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Mm hm.
15	PAUL: If you go down to Bonds Road,
16	they it's more than one or two trucks. Go
17	down to Bonds Road where they bring that water.
18	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: No, I know there's
19	more than one truck.
20	PAUL: I said it looks like a truck
21	stop.
22	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: No, I know.
23	PAUL: With all the oil drippings on
24	the ground. I mean there's more than one more
25	than 10 trucks, more than 20 trucks have been

1	going there. That's a lot of water they're
2	pulling.
3	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Mm hm.
4	PAUL: And we're not making I don't
5	think we're making as much as we should be doing.

- 8 long it took to build the Empire State Building?
- 9 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Is that

- 11 DIANE MACK: No. I just wondered if
- 12 anybody knows that answer.
- 13 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: It was less than a
- 14 year or something.
- DIANE MACK: It was a year and 45 days.
- 16 TRUSTEE STEVE PRESSER: Give me a

- DIANE MACK: Okay. Does a -- a year
- 19 and 45 days of building 100 plus stories, okay?
- 20 My concern is the fire hydrant outside 2 Decker.
- 21 It's been out for over a year.
- MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Mm hm.
- 23 DIANE MACK: Probably gone on more than
- 24 a year. Somebody put a lock on it.
- 25 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Mm hm.

1 That says out of service. DIANE MACK: 2 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Mm hm. 3 DIANE MACK: And it has a padlock on 4 it. 5 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yup. 6 DIANE MACK: So, my question is, who 7 put the lock on? 8 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: We did. 9 DIANE MACK: And why has it taken more 10 than a year to fix that fire hydrant? 11 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Good question. 12 we had a rash of hydrants go south, I want to say 13 in the fall. And we've repaired everything, we 14 just did the one on Ahern and Somerset. And the 15 one that's at the corner of Capital and Decker in 16 front of Al's house. Is --17 DIANE MACK: Al who? 18 TRUSTEE STEVE PRESSER: Polish guy, I 19 don't know. 20 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: I just call him my 21 Polish buddy. 22 DIANE MACK: Well, that has a bag over 23 it. I want to see --24 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, that has a 25 bag on it because it's out of service and it was

- 1 leaking.
- DIANE MACK: Okay.
- MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: So, we were able to
- 4 | shut it off, but the valve is not -- is faulty.
- 5 So, we're replacing that one come Monday,
- 6 beginning of the week, and the one in front of 1
- 7 Decker, 2 Decker is going to be replaced,
- 8 potentially the same week.
- 9 DIANE MACK: Okay.
- MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: So, that'll be
- 11 done.
- 12 DIANE MACK: So, my question is, why
- does it take over a year for a little old fire
- 14 hydrant to be fixed?
- 15 TRUSTEE STEVE PRESSER: Because they
- 16 don't make parts for that one anymore, so we have
- 17 | to replace it --
- DIANE MACK: Excuse me? I can't hear
- 19 you.
- 20 TRUSTEE STEVE PRESSER: They don't make
- 21 parts for that one anymore, so we had to order a
- 22 new fire hydrant, which took a while to get. By
- 23 the time we got it, it was winter. Everything
- 24 was frozen, so we couldn't do it until it's now
- 25 thawing out.

It went out last March. 1 DIANE MACK: 2 TRUSTEE STEVE PRESSER: I know, and we 3 couldn't get the parts. 4 DIANE MACK: Okay. 5 TRUSTEE STEVE PRESSER: That was the 6 problem. DIANE MACK: Okay. 8 TRUSTEE STEVE PRESSER: We were waiting 9 for the parts, and then finally after a while we 10 find out they're not making the parts anymore. 11 Okay. So, I'm sure we all DIANE MACK: 12 saw the fires in LA, right? That hydrant's out, 13 the next one's out, another one's out. All 14 somebody needs to do is throw a match or 15 cigarette, something out of the grass now that 16 we're in the dry season, right? Brush fires 17 happen around this time of year. 18 Last year in September I asked about 19 that fire hydrant. September. When -- it was 20 before the winter. It went out in March. 21 does it take six months to figure out that we 22 need the parts? 23 TRUSTEE STEVE PRESSER: We -- I just 24 answered your question, Diane.

Excuse me?

DIANE MACK:

1	TRUSTEE STEVE PRESSER: The parts were
2	ordered to fix those hydrants. They kept telling
3	us it's on backorder, it's on backorder. Finally
4	somewhere in the summertime we ended up ordering
5	brand new hydrants going with a different
6	manufacturer. They didn't come in until the
7	wintertime. The ground was frozen, couldn't,
8	obviously, get them out in that time.
9	Now it's starting to thaw out and
10	they'll be put in. So.
11	DIANE MACK: That's amazing to me. But
12	that's besides the point.
13	TRUSTEE STEVE PRESSER: It's amazing to
14	us, too.
15	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, bottom line,
16	it's getting they're getting replaced. Like
17	we mentioned.
18	DIANE MACK: Okay. Say
19	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: When that does
20	occur, the fire departments are notified, they
21	know that the hydrants are out. Typically if
22	there is one out, like say the one in front of 2
23	Decker, there's one potentially of 100 feet
24	or so down the road on the right-hand side. That
25	left for us that that thing froze during the

wintertime during a real cold spell between
January and February, putting both of those out
of service.

Again, the fire department knows, and when they respond they come with the tanker truck.

DIANE MACK: Did they know that -MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: So --

DIANE MACK: -- there was a hydrant out on Clinton Drive when the fire on New Year's Eve happened?

MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: That hydrant wasn't out. The problem was -- it was working, the problem is that they weren't getting the volume of water out of the hydrant. And since that happened, we've investigated all the hydrants. We are now pressure testing the hydrants, because the end of April we'll be doing hydrant flushing.

And we'll be checking pressure on every street to make sure it's acceptable. The problem is, those hydrants on Clinton -- and I want to probably say -- Michael back to when the developing was built that there was a valve -- two valves in the road in a pit that were not opened all the way.

So, certain -- because the houses weren't being affected, just the hydrants. So, we bagged them, we put them out of service, we notified the police department and the fire department, and within that period of time we were troubleshooting everything because it was still winter, so we had to let it warm up a little bit before we start flushing and having water everywhere.

So, when we had a couple of nice days, we went and did it. First time we did it we made sure that the valves were open in the street next to the hydrant. And they were, 100 percent. So, we knew it was something else. And then, in the street itself there's these two vaults, and in there are control handles that were not opened all the way.

We closed them, and then we opened them all the way, and the water pressure was acceptable. So, it is a priority for us. We're not -- and this one was out of service for a while, there's no doubt about it. But the hydrant --

DIANE MACK: Over a year.

MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- situation, it's

1 a priority. And when something goes out, we'll 2 be replacing it because we bought additional 3 hydrants so that we don't have to wait and order 4 Because ordering things today is just a 5 nightmare. 6 DIANE MACK: Okay. You say priority. 7 I hope so. 8 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah. Definitely. 9 DIANE MACK: Okay. No disrespect to 10 anybody here, but the Christmas Trees on Ahern. 11 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yup. 12 DIANE MACK: I mean the trees on Ahern. 13 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yup. 14 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: The 15 Cherry Blossoms? MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yup. 16 17 DIANE MACK: Yeah. Finally the 18 Christmas decorations were taken off of them. 19 There should be quidelines. And I'm not saying 20 you can't put them up, but you put them up 21 December, they should come down by like January 22 15th, something like that. 23 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well --24 DIANE MACK: Just a thought.

MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- the way we're

1 addressing this, Diane, is those trees were 2 purchased by residents in memory of somebody. 3 DIANE MACK: I understand that, like I said. 4 No disrespect. 5 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: So, if the family 6 wants to leave the balls on the trees --WOMAN 1: That's me. 8 DIANE MACK: I'm sorry. 9 WOMAN 1: And I apologize. 10 DIANE MACK: No, no I'm just -- no 11 disrespect. 12 WOMAN 1: The lights are off. 13 DIANE MACK: No, no, no, no. 14 WOMAN 1: But the lights are off. 15 turned them off, I'm going to get a ladder 16 tomorrow, I will go and take them down. 17 DIANE MACK: No, not those. Not those. 18 Okay, and like I said, no disrespect. But the 19 same was as, when you're going into get ashes on 20 ash Wednesday and there's Christmas decorations 21 in the flowerpot. I'm just saying there should 22 be guidelines. You put them up on a certain day, 23 you take them down at a certain point. 24 Same -- right in the center of town.

The Christmas decorations were there for months.

1	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yes.
2	DIANE MACK: Nobody saw that?
3	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Yes, we
4	did.
5	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: No, we did. But
6	they were frozen
7	DIANE MACK: So then why weren't
8	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: to the pots,
9	Diane. They were frozen inside the pots, and if
10	we pulled them out, we would have destroyed what
11	we had, so we had to wait. Normally, these are
12	probably the worst January and February in a lot,
13	a lot of years. Normally that stuff is, and when
14	it's not frozen, we will remove the stuff.
15	We took all the trees down. We took
16	the lights down. But those are in a metal ring,
17	one piece, and they sit on top of the planter.
18	Those were frozen solid to the dirt.
19	DIANE MACK: Okay.
20	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: And we waited, and
21	once we had it, we pulled them up, they're in
22	bags, and they're upstairs for next year.
23	DIANE MACK: So you're going to use
24	them again next year even if they were sitting
25	out for three, four months?

1	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: That's what we did
2	the year before.
3	DIANE MACK: Okay.
4	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: They're the same
5	decorations. If they're ruined or something
6	happened to them, then they get replaced.
7	DIANE MACK: Okay.
8	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: But at the end of
9	the day, yeah. We reuse them. We don't throw
10	that stuff out. It's expensive.
11	DIANE MACK: Okay. One question
12	another question. The previous front desk clerk,
13	how much was her salary, that this one was going
14	to \$20 an hour? No, no, they said the front
15	Collins getting paid \$20 an hour.
16	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right, the
17	DIANE MACK: How much was the previous
18	clerk's salary?
19	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Joan?
20	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Joan was I think
21	she was about 18.
22	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: The new
23	Clerk that we hired for the PM is \$20 an hour.
24	DIANE MACK: The previous clerk.
25	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: The previous I

- 1 believe was --
- 2 DIANE MACK: Joan. How much did
- 3 (indiscernible).
- 4 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: No, no, no.
- 5 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: The front
- 6 for the PM.
- 7 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: (indiscernible).
- 8 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: No, I
- 9 know.
- MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: It was 16 or --
- 11 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: We're not
- 12 positive.
- 13 DIANE MACK: I can't hear.
- 14 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: I think it was
- 15 about \$18.
- 16 DIANE MACK: Okay, so that's all I
- 17 | wanted to know.
- 18 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Somewhere in that
- 19 neighborhood. 50. Could be --
- DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: \$18.50.
- 21 DIANE MACK: Thank you.
- DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: I
- 23 believe.
- 24 DIANE MACK: That's wonderful when you
- 25 use that. Okay. I just have another

- 1 observation. So, do you know where the 2 laundromat is in town? 3 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah. 4 DIANE MACK: The Bubble Basin? 5 they own five spots there in the parking lot. 6 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: They own the spots 7 between 208 and the building, and they own five 8 spots --9 DIANE MACK: In the back.
- MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- on the back
- 11 side.
- 12 DIANE MACK: Okay. So those ones in
- 13 the back, has anybody been back there lately?
- MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah.
- DIANE MACK: Okay, did you look at the
- 16 | fence that's --
- 17 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yup.
- 18 DIANE MACK: -- hold -- do you know
- 19 what's holding the fence up?
- 20 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Are you talking the
- 21 | space that opens up?
- 22 DIANE MACK: Well, it's the fence. The
- 23 fence is kind of leaning. It needs to be
- 24 repaired. And --
- MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, there's a

- 1 door there.
- DIANE MACK: No, I'm talking about --
- 3 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: So, it's to the
- 4 left of the spaces that this guy owns.
- 5 DIANE MACK: They come -- they have
- 6 | five spaces.
- 7 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yup.
- B DIANE MACK: Here's the fence, right?
- 9 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah.
- 10 DIANE MACK: The fence is tipping into
- 11 | the (indiscernible). The being -- the fence is
- 12 being held up by zip ties onto the guardrail.
- 13 And I know there was an event in the parking lot
- 14 there recently.
- MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: In March, yeah.
- 16 DIANE MACK: Yeah.
- 17 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah.
- 18 DIANE MACK: I think the fence should
- 19 be fixed. I don't think zip ties should be
- 20 holding a fence from falling in.
- 21 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, we'll check
- 22 that. I wasn't aware that zip ties were holding
- 23 the fence. But we'll take a look at that for
- 24 you.
- DIANE MACK: Yeah, there's like five,

1	six zip ties trying to
2	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Sure.
3	DIANE MACK: hold the fence back.
4	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: We'll look at that
5	tomorrow for you, Diane.
6	DIANE MACK: Okay. One last thing.
7	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Sure.
8	DIANE MACK: I keep hearing the past
9	administration, I got letters at home because the
10	previous administration
11	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Mm hm.
12	DIANE MACK: for the last two years,
13	we've been trying to do things like this. But
14	then I also read an article that said Tom, that
15	you were celebrating your or starting your
16	37th, your 38th year of service to the Village.
17	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Mm hm.
18	DIANE MACK: Please stop saying the
19	previous administration. Because technically,
20	you are the previous administration. So
21	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Sure. But I wasn't
22	responsible to cause the chaos and financial
23	disaster that was presented. So yeah, I'm past
24	administrations, I'm past years here, absolutely.
25	But

1	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: When we
2	say the prior administration, Diane, you know
3	we're referencing the administration right before
4	us.
5	DIANE MACK: Can you speak up into the
6	mic? I can't hear you.
7	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: When we -
8	- because those letters went out in a resident
9	letter. When we say the prior administration, we
10	are not referencing every administration before
11	us. We are referencing the one administration
12	prior to us stepping in.
13	DIANE MACK: But you are now the
14	previous administration. So just it just
15	doesn't sound good, that's all I'm saying.
16	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, you know it
17	doesn't sound good, it doesn't feel good. And
18	it's terrible even to say that. And we struggled
19	a lot on how we were going to present this to the
20	people and have the openness and the clarity and
21	the everything else so people would understand
22	what's going on.
23	There are people in this Village that
24	still don't understand, and when they ask, they

get told what happened. And --

1	DIANE MACK: And what did happen?
2	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: this isn't
3	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: What did
4	happen?
5	DIANE MACK: Yeah.
6	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: What happened?
7	DIANE MACK: I'd like to know.
8	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Do you
9	understand what we inherited here? I
10	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: All right. So
11	we get into office, and two, three days into it,
12	we find out that 1.6 million dollars of what
13	previous administration had approved for a
14	budget, they spent in two weeks when we took
15	office on it might have been April 2nd or
16	whatever it was two years ago on 23.
17	And then we started to see a lot of
18	bills, and all the bills that were created,
19	pretty much, I want to say from 17, there was
20	never, that I recall, a resolution at this dais
21	to accept warrants and bills. And all the checks
22	were generated out of the Mayor's desk in his
23	office.
24	Because the day I started, I went to
25	the front desk person, I said why are all these

bills stacked here? She goes, well those are for you, because what the previous guy did was grab those bills, take them into his office, and cut checks. So, that moment, everything stopped.

From a process of what was going on.

Because what we thought was bad was not bad. It
was a disaster. In 21, if a couple of checks did
not come into this Village as a surprise from
either ARPER or FEMA, your doors were shut. They
were done.

This place would have been closed.

Every employee would have walked out -- would not have a job. That's how bad it was in 21, and it just escalated. And they were printing checks -- you know when the checks were printed? When the new tax season started. Because he was seven or eight months behind in health insurance payments when we took office.

And how in the hell that insurance was never cancelled is beyond belief. 1.6 million dollars.

DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: We had told we were six months away from a shutdown, number one. Number two, no financials were ever submitted to the State in six years. Somebody

asked earlier, I think you did Bill, on when the 1 2 deadline is for us to submit to the State? 3 don't want to be quoted, I think that it's three 4 months after the fiscal year --5 BILL BRAID: Normally it's 6 (indiscernible). DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: 8 regardless, they were never submitted. We had no 9 bond rating. As you know, we inherited 4.4 10 million dollars in debt. From the prior 11 administration. 12 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: (indiscernible) 13 right, and part of that is coming down, which is 14 a really good sign. 15 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: 16 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: But, there was 17 \$1,040,000 that was out there sitting in EFC 18 Country in Albany because in 2020 the bills for 19 the sewer project ceased to process. And all the 20 money that was being spent to cover the 21 contractor's costs were coming out of our budget. 22 Yes, Sir. 23 EDWARD HERNANDEZ: I'm fairly new to 24 this, I just moved to the neighborhood about two 25 years ago, two and a half, and I want to thank

1 you for getting back to me on precisely this 2 issue of the taxes. 3 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: You're Edward. 4 You're Edward. 5 EDWARD HERNANDEZ: Edward, yes. 6 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yes, Sir. 7 EDWARD HERNANDEZ: Edward Hernandez. Α 8 month after (indiscernible). So my question to 9 piggyback off of her, I think you had mentioned 10 that it was being -- they were doing accounting, 11 correct? The State was taking a look at this? 12 If I'm not --13 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah. 14 EDWARD HERNANDEZ: Right. So my 15 question is, is there a difference between a 16 forensic audit to what the State is doing 17 normally to look at your -- it's one thing to 18 look at books and just go line by line, okay --19 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right. 20 EDWARD HERNANDEZ: -- they spent this, 21 this, but when you're talking a forensic, they go 22 through everything. 23 TRUSTEE STEVE PRESSER: That's what

EDWARD HERNANDEZ:

they're investigating.

24

25

I mean, every nook

1 and cranny, who did it, what was said, when it 2 was said, what time you left, everything is done. 3 So, my question is, is a forensic audit being 4 done to this mishap that you're talking about? 5 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: No. I -- we asked 6 for a forensic audit --7 EDWARD HERNANDEZ: Forensic. 8 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- they felt that 9 it would have to be investigated to feel like 10 there is enough information there to do a 11 forensic audit. And this started from one of the State auditing firms -- or one of the State 12 13 auditor groups, I'll call it. That was last 14 year. 15 They did a high level, pretty similar 16 to what a regular audit --17 EDWARD HERNANDEZ: But not a forensic -18 19 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Not a forensic, no. 20 EDWARD HERNANDEZ: But not a forensic 21 audit. 22 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: No. No, they did 23 not. 24 EDWARD HERNANDEZ: So, the bells -- I 25 mean, there were signs. I imagine something went

- off, right, some sirens or bells, wait a minute,
- 2 | this ain't -- this --
- DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: I
- 4 | actually talked to --
- 5 EDWARD HERNANDEZ: -- why didn't they
 6 move it onto the next level and say well, let's
- 7 do a forensic audit?
- 8 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Before we
- 9 took office, we didn't know what we were stepping
- 10 into. We were -- the three of us who ran
- 11 together initially, Tom, Susan, and myself, came
- 12 to every meeting, we're at the budget hearing.
- 13 Many of you in this room were there as well. We
- 14 knew things didn't add up.
- We were running. We didn't know what
- 16 | we were going to step into. I contacted the
- 17 | Comptroller's office, and --
- 18 EDWARD HERNANDEZ: The State. The
- 19 | State Controller's office.
- 20 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah.
- 21 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Yes, the
- 22 | State Comptroller's office.
- 23 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yup.
- 24 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: And I
- 25 spoke to an investigator there. That's not how

it works. So, certain things you can do as a resident, and then other things had to wait until we took office. We took office, the phone call was made again, because again, we didn't know what we were stepping into. Our brain -- our heads were spinning.

It was explained that they -- and they did, they sent somebody from the State. We thought initially it was going to be maybe three months, it ended up being what Christine, over a year? Well over a year. That is not a forensic audit. You have to go through the process.

They look at the numbers only. What their job is to do is to dissect the numbers, and they did. What should have been a few months ended up being well over a year. That data and information then gets submitted, and now it's in their hands. That just ended this winter, only a couple months back I think, we concluded that process.

EDWARD HERNANDEZ: But there's -
DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: So, not
to say that there isn't. They won't speak about
that piece of it, the legal piece. They're
looking at the accounting piece and the numbers.

1 EDWARD HERNANDEZ: Oh, so it's an 2 ongoing process. 3 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Well, she 4 submits -- they submit their data. And then it 5 goes to a different department for determinations to be made. 6 EDWARD HERNANDEZ: But there's nothing 8 stopping you -- when I say you, the Village of 9 Washingtonville, this entity, from saying we're 10 going to get our own auditors and do a forensic -11 12 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: You have 13 to --14 EDWARD HERNANDEZ: -- you have that 15 right, correct? 16 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Oh, 17 absolutely. 18 CHRIS: That's a lot of money. 19 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: And we do 20 have --21 EDWARD HERNANDEZ: Just like if I was a 22 billionaire and I could say, you know what? I'm 23 going to get some big, highfalutin law firm and 24 I'm going to do my own forensic audit, because it 25 don't sound right to me.

1 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Well, we 2 have our own auditors. 3 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right. 4 EDWARD HERNANDEZ: Right, but --5 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: We have two 6 auditing firms right now. One trying to collect 7 the data, the other one is actually performing 8 the audits. 9 EDWARD HERNANDEZ: But it's still --10 they haven't come out with --11 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: It's all in motion. 12 Yeah. 13 EDWARD HERNANDEZ: -- an analysis --14 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: It's all in motion. 15 EDWARD HERNANDEZ: -- and -- to really 16 find out --17 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: And we have another 18 State agency, another accounting group out of 19 Albany, they're locals as well. 20 EDWARD HERNANDEZ: Yeah. 21 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: But they're doing a 22 deficit audit for 2022 and 2023 year end. 23 EDWARD HERNANDEZ: Oh, okay. 24 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: And that's in 25 process right now.

EDWARD HERNANDEZ: Oh, so the -
MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: There, in my

estimation as a non-financial guy, they're doing

4 a deeper dive than anybody's done so far.

EDWARD HERNANDEZ: Yeah.

MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay? But from an accounting standpoint, we have the 21 audit done, 22 audit done, the 23 audit is now done, 24 and 25 will be right behind that, and all the AFR's that are supposed to be submitted have been submitted. People out there I guess are recognizing that we're -- we turned a corner and hopefully we're getting better, because when we borrowed money the first time it was 7. -- potentially two percent borrowing bonds.

Now we went down to, I think it was six, and now we're hoping we're going to be down in the neighborhood of four to five. So, that would be our final long-term debt that needs to be paid off within now I think, because we've been doing this for two years, will be an eight year loan.

And whatever that dollar amount ends up being, like it's been in the past, the last two years, that'll be split up and divided amongst

1	all the residents. To get us back to level
2	playing field. One of the just to mention
3	too, when we got here we were looking at a 40
4	percent increase in taxes, because taxes, as
5	Donna mentioned, were never increased.
6	Water rates were never increased.
7	Sewer rates were never increased. So, everything
8	was stagnant for six years. And without having
9	an accounting system or a treasurer or anybody to
10	keep track of that stuff, it was like putting a
11	blindfold in and jumping in a plane and trying to
12	fly.
13	Because you had no idea. None at all.
14	These guys look at us like they just shook
15	their heads. There was disbelief. Yeah.
16	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: We're not
17	here to speculate. So, we depend on the
18	professionals to do that piece. We can confirm
19	there was definitely mismanagement, and other

MAN 3: I think we asked this question when we were here once before. No one's encountered any -- or no one's uncovered any concrete evidence of fraud, it's just incompetence?

than that, we're not going to speculate.

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1	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Not that
2	we're aware of to date.
3	MAN 3: It's strictly incompetence?
4	TRUSTEE STEVE PRESSER: They don't tell
5	us that (indiscernible)
6	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: They
7	can't tell us. They won't.
8	MAN 3: Yeah, I mean unless you could
9	charge them with something
10	VINNIE: Well Brendan that guy
11	Brendan did mention it, but he said it. He
12	hasn't seen any kind of
13	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Right.
14	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right.
15	VINNIE: Flaw.
16	TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: And no
17	malfeasance has been
18	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: gross
19	malmanagement. Just not forget about
20	following the County, there was no attempt. So.
21	(indiscernible). Anybody else? Paul.
22	PAUL: One last thing. We'll end it
23	with this, and I'm surprised this wasn't on the
24	agenda. Especially as somebody very close to
25	vou. We the people Memorial Day parade. Your

16	MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: We've been talking
17	to Stuart, so we're trying to get some military
18	vehicles like we've had in the past. The parade
19	will be and I think I know the guy's name, but
20	I'm not going to leak it out, but one of our VFW

22	DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Grand
23	Marshal.
