MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: All right, to start would be public comment on agenda items. Anyone has any questions? Okay, if not, we'll move right into our announcements and discussion.

So, first thing on that list is the sewer plan (indiscernible) project has been completed, done, signed off, warranties are in place. A couple of punch items that need to be completed. When it warms up a little bit, there's some debris that was frozen to the ground, and a downed pipe that needed to be extended, and a chimney cap that needs to be replaced. So, very small items that need to be done, just waiting for the ground to thaw a little bit, so this, these things can be done.

Internally now, the rooms have been going through repairs and getting ready to install new ceiling tiles. And we did some work on the lighting that was in there that's been there since probably over 25 years. And we've installed some LED lighting to take advantage of some rebates from (indiscernible), that we'll be

1 applying for. So, that is completed.

Next is a status update. I'll turn this over to -- do you want this one? You have it then. Basically, the Orange County accepted, so the comprehensive plan adoption of 2024, turn that over to Don.

DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Okay, so we received back from the County recently, a letter with a huge thumbs up, commending us on our ability for having a well-balanced, unique plan. You want me to read the letter?

MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, please.

DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Okay.

This is coming from the Department of Planning,
Commissioner of Planning, Orange County. The

Department has received the comprehensive plan
mentioned above and has found no evidence that
its approval would result in significant
intermunicipal or countywide impacts. Overall,
the proposed comprehensive plan is well written
and well balanced. It's charged to retain the

Village's unique character and heritage, while
providing opportunities for (indiscernible)
development and growth. We appreciate the

Village's effort to protect environmental

1 resources, preserve open space, support a 2 diversity of housing options for all residents, 3 revitalize downtown, and address many other We also appreciate the Village's stated support of the County's proposed Schunnemunk rail 5 trail. 6 So, I'm very pleased and proud of that 8 letter. It's been two years of hard work from 9 that committee and the Board. 10 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, I think we 11 should probably send a copy onto the 12 Comprehensive Plan Committee itself. DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Did you 13 14 guys receive this letter? 15 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Did you get a copy of it, by chance? 16 17 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: I'll be 18 forwarding to you. 19 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: We'll follow up on 20 it to make sure you're all aware of it, because 21 it's really kudos to you and everybody that was a

- 8 Committee, some of you were here. There was a
- 9 lot of public comment. They went back to the
- 10 back room, resumed, and they recommended the plan
- 11 to the Village Board. So, it's now in the
- 12 | Village Board's hands. We received an update
- with all those public comments, and a request
- 14 from a landowner who had wanted us to meet with
- 15 him and his team regarding a large parcel for
- 16 development. The Mayor and I had done that. We
- 17 received an updated engineer report from the
- 18 owner and forwarded that onto the Comp Committee
- 19 for their review, as long, as well as all those
- 20 other public comments. So, it was in a concise
- 21 email for them to review, possibly come back with
- 22 any further comments regarding them. And it was
- 23 also addressed (indiscernible) to the Village
- 24 Board (indiscernible).
- So, at this point, tonight actually, we

- 1 will be declaring ourselves as lead agency for 2 the Comprehensive Plan. The County only 3 received, to date, the Comp Plan, not the zoning piece. So, about the end of this week, early next week, we should receive back, from our 5 6 planner, the draft zoning. That has been a work 7 in progress by our Board, with the planner, for 8 about a year. So, all eyes were on it, Building 9 Department's eyes were on it. We made our 10 comments. She's doing those edits, and should 11 come back to us, like I said, by the end of this 12 week, early next week. So, that brings us 13 towards the end of February.
 - Once we receive that, we are requesting 7 to 14 days for us to review it one last time. The Building Department will as well.

On or around March 17, our planner should have completed the environmental assessment form, also known as the EAF, which is required for SEQR. That will get submitted on or about early April. There will be a public hearing for both the comprehensive and the zoning piece; one public hearing, held by the Village Board. Right now we have a tentative date of April 7, but that's not in stone yet. By mid-

April, SEQR should be adopted. And then the last step would be the filing of the local law. And the end date for that is, we're shooting for the end of April. So, we're right where we hoped to be. And that's about all I have, unless anybody has questions.

MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Thank you, Donna, great report. And once again, planning piece with Bonnie and the Board. I mean, it's a real good team effort I think amongst all. And you know, the positive feedback when the Orange County Planning, I think, is just a good indicator of, again, all the hard work that was put in. And we're just about there, so that's really, really good news at the end of the day. So, thank you. Next on the list was an update on the short-term rentals. So, continue with that.

DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: I reached out to several different municipalities. I didn't hear back from all of them, but one of them that stood out was Clarkstown, down in Rockland. We were kind of using Clarkstown as a model for long-term rentals. So, we thought, reach out to them for their short-term rentals. We've noticed that they had it in place at one

point, and then they didn't. So, I was just curious as to why. I spoke with the building inspector. And apparently -- I'm trying to think of the year here -- it was a couple of years back, I believe. They had a large structure, short-term rental, that was being rented out and used for shooting a rap video. Apparently, there were three guys that were excluded from this, and decided to take some guns and shoot up the house. So, that's not the reason they stopped it; that was just the last straw.

So, when I asked them, if that didn't happen, where would you be? They said they would have still decided not to move forward with the short-term rentals. Some of the reasons were, it required a lot more PD to patrol. It was very hard to keep a grip on compliance. There were more fire department calls. They were getting resident complaints from parking on the lawns, not just one or two cars; up to a dozen. Noise ordinances were not in compliance. People were using it to have major parties. Residents were There was a greater concern for not happy. safety. Pools were even being rented by the hour, not just the day.

Because at the end of the day, the revenue, whatever it might be, and we still need to then figure that out and taking that suggestion that you just gave, is find out from these different municipalities, what is

So, you might want to add that to it. You have a party and something goes wrong, you are responsible for the PD, the FD, whoever. Because this is not your personal home, this is a rental. And you're putting the burden on the village people.

mean, the laws, I looked at the town of Hamilton, totally different situation, because it's really a college town; has actually two colleges there, and a hospital. And they had a lot of people coming in there because of schools, and a lot of people were going in and buying the homes. So, and then turning around and then renting them. So, they were finding out most, a lot of the people that were moving into town were the homeowners, who were actually out of town people,

- 1 not people that were buying it to live there. 2 So, they created their short-term rental to kind 3 of slow that process down and make it where they wanted people to live there. So, it's a different scenario. 5 Their fee was \$200 a year, 6 was probably just a application type fee. been going for the training.

And what this system is supposed to be doing is -- and I'll just read this from the post that they put out there. But it replaces outdated law enforcement systems that no longer support with a modern integrated platform, hosted by Orange County system; eliminates data silos, provides real time access to critical information, and enhances officers' response and capabilities.

So, all in all, rather than everybody having their own databases, now it's going to be shared under one database. And it's also cumulative, working with the 911 computer aid dispatch system. They describe it as a single pane of glass for all Orange County municipalities' law enforcement agencies to access and share that vital information. So, it'll be more real time. They go onto say, it's faster incident responses, enhance crime prevention, streamline investigation, stronger community policing, greater accountability. And last but not least, the increased officers' awareness, giving them greater visibility into

criminal activity across municipalities'
jurisdiction, enables the aggregate perspective.

And with this, along with -- and I'm sure everybody's seen them driving around -- but the camera systems that are going up all over the place, not only plate readers, but all of the video that you see, you know, it's really a collaborative effort and will definitely be helping all of our law enforcement officers across Orange County. So, it'll be a great implementation as we get there.

So, again, our department, Chris
Martin, has been attending the trainings for a
couple of months. And we're just waiting in
line. And I'll check in with the chief to see
when, potentially, we will be going on this
system. We'll come on that.

Next, with just an update on auditors' costs that we'll be dealing with, the deficit financing between all the accounting firms.

Nothing from the State, we don't get billed from the State. They take enough of our money. But between PKF and BST, we're in the neighborhood right now of \$260,000 that we've paid. We have finished the, what do they call them, the ARFs,

- which is the yearly reporting that's done in house. We submit that information to AFR.
- 3 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO:
- 4 (indiscernible) financial --

MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right, all financial, annual financial reporting. And so, we're up to date up to '24 with that information. That's really good. We have a couple of items left on the '23 budget and, which is '23-'24, or actually '23. '24 budget audit has begun and, you know, more to come on that. But just want to give you a snapshot on the amount of money that has been spent to date.

And also, recently, Orange County has passed a veteran's tax exemption. So, they have raised it -- I was just on the phone with one of the legislators trying to get some more information. Because I had a conversation with Vinnie, because he was doing some follow-up based on seeing this post, I guess, or maybe you knew about it previously. But you know, where it stands, in essence, if you're a veteran, what you can do, if you're already a veteran in this program, they're really just saying there's nothing you need to do. But if you're not, then

- you need to be eligible and you need to reach out

And then some municipalities have saved tens of thousands of dollars because now they're not paying it. So, I'm trying to get that information from different
