1 ALL: I pledge allegiance to the flag

6 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Thank you everyone
7 for joining us this evening on this really,
8 really cold night for our work session, February
9 18, 2025. And we've had The Pledge of
10 Allegiance, thank you very much.

11 We just need to jump down to a
12 resolution to appoint Jeffrey LaDeau. And then
13 we will (indiscernible) go right through to the
14 ceremony. So, without any further ado, for
15 Resolution 250028 --

16 (Crosstalk)

17 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- to appoint
18 Jeffrey LeDeau to the Zoning Board of Appeals, to
19 fill the unexpired term of former member Richard
20 Budakowski, until April 2, 2029. Can I have a
21 motion please?

22 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Motion to
23 approve.

24 STEVE PRESSER: Second.

25 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Motion by Donna,

1 second by Steve. Any questions? Comments? All
2 in favor?

3 BOARD: Aye.

4 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Motion passes with
5 one absent. Okay, now, Christine, if you don't
6 mind, we can proceed. Jeff, if you don't mind
7 coming up.

8 JEFFREY LADEAU: Thank you.

9 (Crosstalk)

10 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Could you just
11 raise your right hand and repeat after me? I,
12 Jeffrey LaDeau --

13 JEFFREY LADEAU: I, Jeffrey LaDeau --

14 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: -- do solemnly
15 swear --

16 JEFFREY LADEAU: -- do solemnly swear -
17 -

18 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: -- that I will
19 support the Constitution --

20 JEFFREY LADEAU: -- that I will support
21 the Constitution.

22 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: -- of the United
23 States --

24 JEFFREY LADEAU: -- of the United
25 States --

1 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: -- and the State
2 of New York --

3 JEFFREY LADEAU: -- and the State of
4 New York --

5 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: And that I will
6 faithfully discharge the duties --

7 JEFFREY LADEAU: -- that I will
8 faithfully discharge the duties --

9 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: -- of Planning
10 and Zoning Board member --

11 JEFFREY LADEAU: -- of Planning and
12 Zoning Board member --

13 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: -- to the best
14 of my ability.

15 JEFFREY LADEAU: -- to the best of my
16 ability.

17 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Congratulations.

18 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO:
19 (indiscernible) the board members here this
20 evening.

21 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Cheering you on.

22 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO:
23 (indiscernible) introduce themselves.

24 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Thank you very much
25 for taking that on, appreciate it very much.

1 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Nancy and
2 Patrice (indiscernible) --

3 (Crosstalk)

4 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: All right, to start
5 would be public comment on agenda items. Anyone
6 has any questions? Okay, if not, we'll move
7 right into our announcements and discussion.

8 So, first thing on that list is the
9 sewer plan (indiscernible) project has been
10 completed, done, signed off, warranties are in
11 place. A couple of punch items that need to be
12 completed. When it warms up a little bit,
13 there's some debris that was frozen to the
14 ground, and a downed pipe that needed to be
15 extended, and a chimney cap that needs to be
16 replaced. So, very small items that need to be
17 done, just waiting for the ground to thaw a
18 little bit, so this, these things can be done.

19 Internally now, the rooms have been
20 going through repairs and getting ready to
21 install new ceiling tiles. And we did some work
22 on the lighting that was in there that's been
23 there since probably over 25 years. And we've
24 installed some LED lighting to take advantage of
25 some rebates from (indiscernible), that we'll be

1 applying for. So, that is completed.

2 Next is a status update. I'll turn
3 this over to -- do you want this one? You have
4 it then. Basically, the Orange County accepted,
5 so the comprehensive plan adoption of 2024, turn
6 that over to Don.

7 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Okay, so
8 we received back from the County recently, a
9 letter with a huge thumbs up, commending us on
10 our ability for having a well-balanced, unique
11 plan. You want me to read the letter?

12 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, please.

13 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Okay.
14 This is coming from the Department of Planning,
15 Commissioner of Planning, Orange County. The
16 Department has received the comprehensive plan
17 mentioned above and has found no evidence that
18 its approval would result in significant
19 intermunicipal or countywide impacts. Overall,
20 the proposed comprehensive plan is well written
21 and well balanced. It's charged to retain the
22 Village's unique character and heritage, while
23 providing opportunities for (indiscernible)
24 development and growth. We appreciate the
25 Village's effort to protect environmental

1 resources, preserve open space, support a
2 diversity of housing options for all residents,
3 revitalize downtown, and address many other
4 issues. We also appreciate the Village's stated
5 support of the County's proposed Schunnemunk rail
6 trail.

7 So, I'm very pleased and proud of that
8 letter. It's been two years of hard work from
9 that committee and the Board.

10 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, I think we
11 should probably send a copy onto the
12 Comprehensive Plan Committee itself.

13 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Did you
14 guys receive this letter?

15 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Did you get a copy
16 of it, by chance?

17 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: I'll be
18 forwarding to you.

19 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: We'll follow up on
20 it to make sure you're all aware of it, because
21 it's really kudos to you and everybody that was a
22 part of that committee and put all that time and
23 effort over a real lengthy period of time. So,
24 it's a good, it's a really nice letter.

25 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Are we

1 doing the update now or we'll come back to that?

2 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: You can actually --
3 yeah, you want to do the update? Sure, fine. Do
4 it.

5 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Okay, so
6 just a status report. Since the last meeting,
7 the public hearing for the Comprehensive
8 Committee, some of you were here. There was a
9 lot of public comment. They went back to the
10 back room, resumed, and they recommended the plan
11 to the Village Board. So, it's now in the
12 Village Board's hands. We received an update
13 with all those public comments, and a request
14 from a landowner who had wanted us to meet with
15 him and his team regarding a large parcel for
16 development. The Mayor and I had done that. We
17 received an updated engineer report from the
18 owner and forwarded that onto the Comp Committee
19 for their review, as long, as well as all those
20 other public comments. So, it was in a concise
21 email for them to review, possibly come back with
22 any further comments regarding them. And it was
23 also addressed (indiscernible) to the Village
24 Board (indiscernible).

25 So, at this point, tonight actually, we

1 will be declaring ourselves as lead agency for
2 the Comprehensive Plan. The County only
3 received, to date, the Comp Plan, not the zoning
4 piece. So, about the end of this week, early
5 next week, we should receive back, from our
6 planner, the draft zoning. That has been a work
7 in progress by our Board, with the planner, for
8 about a year. So, all eyes were on it, Building
9 Department's eyes were on it. We made our
10 comments. She's doing those edits, and should
11 come back to us, like I said, by the end of this
12 week, early next week. So, that brings us
13 towards the end of February.

14 Once we receive that, we are requesting
15 7 to 14 days for us to review it one last time.
16 The Building Department will as well.

17 On or around March 17, our planner
18 should have completed the environmental
19 assessment form, also known as the EAF, which is
20 required for SEQOR. That will get submitted on or
21 about early April. There will be a public
22 hearing for both the comprehensive and the zoning
23 piece; one public hearing, held by the Village
24 Board. Right now we have a tentative date of
25 April 7, but that's not in stone yet. By mid-

1 April, SEQR should be adopted. And then the last
2 step would be the filing of the local law. And
3 the end date for that is, we're shooting for the
4 end of April. So, we're right where we hoped to
5 be. And that's about all I have, unless anybody
6 has questions.

7 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Thank you, Donna,
8 great report. And once again, planning piece
9 with Bonnie and the Board. I mean, it's a real
10 good team effort I think amongst all. And you
11 know, the positive feedback when the Orange
12 County Planning, I think, is just a good
13 indicator of, again, all the hard work that was
14 put in. And we're just about there, so that's
15 really, really good news at the end of the day.
16 So, thank you. Next on the list was an update on
17 the short-term rentals. So, continue with that.

18 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: I reached
19 out to several different municipalities. I
20 didn't hear back from all of them, but one of
21 them that stood out was Clarkstown, down in
22 Rockland. We were kind of using Clarkstown as a
23 model for long-term rentals. So, we thought,
24 reach out to them for their short-term rentals.
25 We've noticed that they had it in place at one

1 point, and then they didn't. So, I was just
2 curious as to why. I spoke with the building
3 inspector. And apparently -- I'm trying to think
4 of the year here -- it was a couple of years
5 back, I believe. They had a large structure,
6 short-term rental, that was being rented out and
7 used for shooting a rap video. Apparently, there
8 were three guys that were excluded from this, and
9 decided to take some guns and shoot up the house.
10 So, that's not the reason they stopped it; that
11 was just the last straw.

12 So, when I asked them, if that didn't
13 happen, where would you be? They said they would
14 have still decided not to move forward with the
15 short-term rentals. Some of the reasons were, it
16 required a lot more PD to patrol. It was very
17 hard to keep a grip on compliance. There were
18 more fire department calls. They were getting
19 resident complaints from parking on the lawns,
20 not just one or two cars; up to a dozen. Noise
21 ordinances were not in compliance. People were
22 using it to have major parties. Residents were
23 not happy. There was a greater concern for
24 safety. Pools were even being rented by the
25 hour, not just the day.

1 And so, I asked them, I was curious
2 also, about revenue, because that's a big piece
3 of it. And this really surprised me; they
4 charged \$250 for two years. So, there was not
5 much revenue going on either as well.

6 VINNIE: I was -- yeah -- a poor
7 example of a short-term rental policy.

8 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: They're
9 not the only ones I reached out to.

10 VINNIE: A \$200 a year, I would jump on
11 that in a heartbeat. It's a percentage of your
12 stay, every stay. That's the way these platforms
13 work. There's no flat rate for the year. Maybe
14 a business license to the village, but a
15 (indiscernible) tax is a percentage of your gross
16 of rentals. That's how they village will
17 generate money. That example that you're giving,
18 this whole example, that policy sounds absurd to
19 me. That has nothing to do with short-term
20 rental. That's -- you're not even allowed to
21 have parties within Airbnb's, VRBOs, they don't
22 allow that.

23 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: They
24 don't allow it, but they were happening --

25 VINNIE: Then they're banned from the

1 platform, that's it. That's a piss poor example,
2 I'm sorry, I gave the example of that town that
3 actually charges an occupancy tax.

4 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: They
5 charge (indiscernible) tax.

6 VINNIE: Having a flat -- that's -- to
7 say that you're not going to generate revenue,
8 that's not factual, I'm sorry.

9 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: (indiscernible)
10 done reporting yet, so why don't you let her
11 finish.

12 VINNIE: How about let me talk and you
13 can sit down and be quiet.

14 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Take it easy,
15 please.

16 VINNIE: I'm not talking to you. I'm
17 talking to them. And you were talking to me.

18 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Please?

19 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: There are
20 very few municipalities in the county that are
21 doing short-term rentals. So, the ones that I
22 found that were, they didn't get back to me.

23 VINNIE: Warwick fought short-term
24 rentals within the village.

25 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Warwick?

1 Sorry?

2 VINNIE: There's only short-term
3 rentals within the village. There's short-term
4 rentals within this village right now.

5 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: But
6 that's just it, right. So --

7 VINNIE: A lot of them. Not just one
8 or two, a lot. And they're currently rented
9 every week. I know houses that are turning and
10 burning all week, every week, every month.

11 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: And I'm
12 not denying that --

13 VINNIE: And that's money generating
14 for the Village that you could be
15 (indiscernible).

16 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: How do you track,
17 and keep track of all the rentals? Say there are
18 100 rentals, how do you keep track of all those
19 rentals?

20 VINNIE: As who? The homeowner or as
21 you the Village?

22 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: As the Village who
23 is expecting tax revenues, and you, as a good
24 citizen --

25 VINNIE: You pass a law --

1 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- renting your
2 house 52 weeks out of the year --

3 VINNIE: I'm going to answer your
4 question.

5 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: How do you do it?

6 VINNIE: When you pass the law and you
7 get the law on the books, you could have Airbnb
8 or VRBO, they'll see that law that's on the
9 books, they will collect that tax immediately off
10 that rental, and pass -- that tax is passed onto
11 the Village. I do it in every one of my towns
12 that I'm in. I pay that town tax, I pay the
13 village tax; if there's a county occupancy tax,
14 it all gets passed through to you guys.

15 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay. That's good
16 info. We're not sitting here putting a stake
17 into its heart at this point. We just want to --

18 VINNIE: Well, after that statement of
19 all the crime, the rap video, that one example of
20 a rap video (indiscernible) --

21 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- with or without
22 this law, I probably, last year, received five
23 phone calls for very large parties and neighbors
24 that were very upset, so...

25 VINNIE: We have that now without a

1 rental.

2 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Exactly.

3 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Right,
4 without short-term rentals.

5 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: What happens when I
6 get the complaint from, you know, it's supposed
7 to be, you know, a family of six, turns out to be
8 a party of 50 to 55, it's loud, music all night
9 long, and then what? Then we have --

10 VINNIE: And we have ordinances within
11 the Village that we enforce. And we don't --

12 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: And that's the
13 other side of this coin though. We know, and we
14 hope it wouldn't happen that frequently. The
15 problem is, here, is that we're very condensed,
16 right? We're 2.5 square miles, very tight
17 residencies, right, everybody's close. And we
18 just don't want that -- and listen, we could move
19 in that direction, with all the right things and
20 it gets out of control, then we pull back like
21 other communities. Because at the end of the
22 day, the revenue, whatever it might be, and we
23 still need to then figure that out and taking
24 that suggestion that you just gave, is find out
25 from these different municipalities, what is

1 their tax revenue, approximately.

2 But we don't want this to be a thing
3 where the Building Department is constantly
4 chasing things, the Police Department is
5 constantly running after parties and all this
6 disruption. So, and we don't want, obviously,
7 the neighbors that are living next to these
8 properties, to be going through this if it's one
9 of those properties that they constantly rent.

10 VINNIE: But Tom, it's already
11 happening now. Do we have any issues now? Are
12 we getting a rap video getting filmed in houses?

13 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Yes.

14 VINNIE: Here?

15 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Yes.

16 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, we did.

17 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Yes, we
18 did.

19 VINNIE: Is that (indiscernible) --

20 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: And we had a very
21 large one --

22 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Hundreds.

23 STEVE PRESSER: -- off of Canterbury.

24 VINNIE: Because regular homeowners,
25 you know, I give parties all summer long

1 (indiscernible) Newcastle Drive, these are
2 regular homeowners, you know. To single out just
3 a short-term rental -- I'm telling you, we're
4 missing out on revenue. We talked about it last
5 meeting, ways to generate revenue; this is a
6 prime example to generate revenue. We have no
7 revenue-generating function within this Village,
8 except property tax.

9 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: And like we said,
10 Vinnie, we're looking into it. We just want to
11 report back to you what we've found so far.
12 Okay.

13 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO:
14 (indiscernible) expressed similar to me. They're
15 considering it. They're not sure how it's going
16 to go over. They also acknowledged that it's not
17 widely practiced in the county. And Clarkstown
18 also explained, like it just kind of didn't make
19 sense, they said, and why, in this area? It's
20 typically more accepted --

21 VINNIE: It's huge within the county
22 because there is a county occupancy tax.

23 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Sorry?

24 VINNIE: You rent on short-term
25 rentals, you're paying a county occupancy tax.

1 There's already a county occupancy tax.

2 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: But what
3 I'm saying is --

4 VINNIE: So, to say it's not being used
5 within the county.

6 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: There are
7 more municipalities not doing them than are.
8 It's not, why do we accept it? For those reasons
9 I mentioned earlier. Goshen expressed the same,
10 similar concerns. There, again, putting it out
11 there, right? What do the residents want? What
12 do the residents want? You know, maybe we'll
13 have a public hearing, a special meeting. And --

14 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: It's still in
15 limbo in the state. The state has looked at
16 this, and to the best of my knowledge, it has not
17 made it through legislative (indiscernible) yet
18 for the governor to sign off, and she has not
19 indicated one way or another if she will sign it.

20 VINNIE: What law is that?

21 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: They are trying
22 to -- at one point the state was looking to make
23 a short-term rental law statewide.

24 VINNIE: Right. But there's no real
25 law on the books for occupancy tax within the

1 county. We can do it. It's not like there's now
2 law on the books.

3 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay.

4 SEAN: Just to back him up, there's
5 (indiscernible) place where you rent, if the cops
6 get called or anything happens, the people are
7 fined and have to pay a fee to the police
8 department and the village for the time that's
9 put into them responding. So, you might want to
10 add that to it. You have a party and something
11 goes wrong, you are responsible for the PD, the
12 FD, whoever. Because this is not your personal
13 home, this is a rental. And you're putting the
14 burden on the village people.

15 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right. Yeah. I
16 mean, the laws, I looked at the town of Hamilton,
17 totally different situation, because it's really
18 a college town; has actually two colleges there,
19 and a hospital. And they had a lot of people
20 coming in there because of schools, and a lot of
21 people were going in and buying the homes. So,
22 and then turning around and then renting them.
23 So, they were finding out most, a lot of the
24 people that were moving into town were the
25 homeowners, who were actually out of town people,

1 not people that were buying it to live there.
2 So, they created their short-term rental to kind
3 of slow that process down and make it where they
4 wanted people to live there. So, it's a
5 different scenario. Their fee was \$200 a year,
6 was probably just a application type fee. And
7 she didn't know really much about the taxes that
8 were being collected and it sounded like maybe
9 they're not even collecting the tax.

10 So, we just wanted to report to you
11 what we found so far. The ball is still moving.
12 We're still going to check it out. You gave some
13 good information, Vinnie. We're going to use
14 that --

15 VINNIE: Our county probably imposes 5
16 percent property tax on every rental, short-term
17 rental, that's every time, if I book for the
18 weekend, 5 percent of that total is going to
19 Orange County. They're getting that money.

20 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay.

21 VINNIE: You guys can impose the same 5
22 percent, if not more. I pay 17 percent in one of
23 my towns.

24 SEAN: There are also places where if
25 you don't live in it, you pay a higher tax

1 because it's a rental. I had a place in Florida,
2 I paid non-homesteader tax, which was double,
3 maybe almost 2.5 times what a resident will pay.

4 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right.

5 SEAN: Because they assumed I'm renting
6 it out, which I wasn't, but they want their money
7 and they deserve their money. Non-occupancy tax
8 might be worth looking into.

9 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: It would
10 be interesting to find out a consensus of what
11 the residents would want. I mean, since the
12 majority of this village is --

13 (Crosstalk)

14 SEAN: -- problem is they're here, the
15 rentals are here. The rentals are all over the
16 place.

17 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: I
18 understand.

19 SEAN: So, we might as well start --

20 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: But if we
21 put it out there to the residents, would they
22 want this or not want this --

23 SEAN: They'll want it. The rentals or
24 the taxes?

25 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: The

1 short-term rentals.

2 (Crosstalk)

3 VINNIE: -- the ones that are already
4 here. You got so many within the town already.
5 They're all over the place. Stone Ridge is full
6 of them, believe it or not. Just go on the app
7 and look. Put in Washingtonville, and you will
8 see all the houses that are for rent, short-term
9 rentals. And they're turning and burning. Every
10 three days there's new people in them.

11 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: And with
12 that app, how do you know if they're short-term
13 or long term?

14 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: If it's on
15 Airbnb --

16 VINNIE: That's all you can have --

17 SEAN: Airbnb --

18 (Crosstalk)

19 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: We're
20 talking about Airbnb?

21 VINNIE: Airbnb, VRBO, Booking.
22 There's so many apps out there. They're on
23 there.

24 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay. More work to
25 do. Thank you. Anything else you want to add or

1 is that it?

2 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: If I hear
3 back from the other municipalities
4 (indiscernible).

5 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: And let's, when we
6 do speak to them, if they do call us back or
7 whatever, let's specifically ask about their, if
8 they were collecting a sales tax.

9 VINNIE: Occupancy.

10 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Occupancy
11 tax.

12 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Occupancy. Okay,
13 cool. Thank you. All righty. Next is an item
14 from Orange County. We received some
15 correspondence regarding this Niche Record
16 Management System for law enforcement. I think
17 we put this on the website for everybody to
18 review. But apparently, the county has been
19 working with some other towns and cities on, as
20 probably the project team of Middletown, Town of
21 Warwick, Village of Monroe, and I think that
22 might be it, maybe another one. But the end of
23 the day, these municipalities have been working
24 with the Niche Record Management. And they
25 basically just launched the system out to these

1 particular municipalities. Our department has
2 been going for the training.

3 And what this system is supposed to be
4 doing is -- and I'll just read this from the post
5 that they put out there. But it replaces
6 outdated law enforcement systems that no longer
7 support with a modern integrated platform, hosted
8 by Orange County system; eliminates data silos,
9 provides real time access to critical
10 information, and enhances officers' response and
11 capabilities.

12 So, all in all, rather than everybody
13 having their own databases, now it's going to be
14 shared under one database. And it's also
15 cumulative, working with the 911 computer aid
16 dispatch system. They describe it as a single
17 pane of glass for all Orange County
18 municipalities' law enforcement agencies to
19 access and share that vital information. So,
20 it'll be more real time. They go onto say, it's
21 faster incident responses, enhance crime
22 prevention, streamline investigation, stronger
23 community policing, greater accountability. And
24 last but not least, the increased officers'
25 awareness, giving them greater visibility into

1 criminal activity across municipalities'
2 jurisdiction, enables the aggregate perspective.

3 And with this, along with -- and I'm
4 sure everybody's seen them driving around -- but
5 the camera systems that are going up all over the
6 place, not only plate readers, but all of the
7 video that you see, you know, it's really a
8 collaborative effort and will definitely be
9 helping all of our law enforcement officers
10 across Orange County. So, it'll be a great
11 implementation as we get there.

12 So, again, our department, Chris
13 Martin, has been attending the trainings for a
14 couple of months. And we're just waiting in
15 line. And I'll check in with the chief to see
16 when, potentially, we will be going on this
17 system. We'll come on that.

18 Next, with just an update on auditors'
19 costs that we'll be dealing with, the deficit
20 financing between all the accounting firms.
21 Nothing from the State, we don't get billed from
22 the State. They take enough of our money. But
23 between PKF and BST, we're in the neighborhood
24 right now of \$260,000 that we've paid. We have
25 finished the, what do they call them, the ARFs,

1 which is the yearly reporting that's done in
2 house. We submit that information to AFR.

3 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO:

4 (indiscernible) financial --

5 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right, all
6 financial, annual financial reporting. And so,
7 we're up to date up to '24 with that information.
8 That's really good. We have a couple of items
9 left on the '23 budget and, which is '23-'24, or
10 actually '23. '24 budget audit has begun and,
11 you know, more to come on that. But just want to
12 give you a snapshot on the amount of money that
13 has been spent to date.

14 And also, recently, Orange County has
15 passed a veteran's tax exemption. So, they have
16 raised it -- I was just on the phone with one of
17 the legislators trying to get some more
18 information. Because I had a conversation with
19 Vinnie, because he was doing some follow-up based
20 on seeing this post, I guess, or maybe you knew
21 about it previously. But you know, where it
22 stands, in essence, if you're a veteran, what you
23 can do, if you're already a veteran in this
24 program, they're really just saying there's
25 nothing you need to do. But if you're not, then

1 you need to be eligible and you need to reach out
2 to the assessor in the Town of Blooming Grove.
3 And once that's done, you don't necessarily need
4 to apply again, according to this information.
5 The deadline for the applications for the
6 community, if you're filling them out, is March
7 1. So, I would double check again with the town
8 assessor. That number is 845-496-5223. And I
9 believe his option is 6. That would get you to
10 the town assessor's --

11 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Tom, you need
12 (indiscernible) doesn't know that you need your
13 DD214 to apply for the exemption.

14 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Thank you. So,
15 there is some more information. And he had
16 mentioned that they have to, that the County had
17 to pass a local law?

18 SEAN: That resolution that they had --

19 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah.

20 SEAN: Was supposed -- should have been
21 a resolution but they made it a law.

22 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay.

23 SEAN: They should have had a public
24 hearing. So, they voted on it and they realized
25 after the fact there should have been a public

1 hearing.

2 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay.

3 SEAN: That resolution was just to
4 raise the caps --

5 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right.

6 SEAN: -- of the exemption. Because
7 the way the caps work and what the equalization
8 rate and yadda, yadda, yadda.

9 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right.

10 SEAN: They're going to have a public
11 hearing next month.

12 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay, so next
13 month. So, probably, then this law won't be in
14 effect until then.

15 SEAN: The law is already there.

16 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, but I mean as
17 far as changing the percentage --

18 SEAN: Yeah.

19 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- that increase
20 probably won't be until next March.

21 SEAN: Regardless --

22 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah.

23 SEAN: -- Orange County can pass it and
24 then it gets put into place --

25 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right.

1 SEAN: -- Blooming Grove would have to
2 do the same thing.

3 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Exactly. Yeah, and
4 so would development, similar to what we did to
5 the fire department exemption.

6 SEAN: I'm going to start
7 (indiscernible) --

8 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: We'll talk
9 (indiscernible). Sorry. So, if you do have any
10 questions, please reach out to the assessor, or
11 give our office a call, we'll help you out
12 wherever we can. Next item is the -- so, we
13 have, for the veterans we received, the County is
14 sponsoring a free movie night for veterans. It
15 will be in Monroe. It's Wednesday, March 5 at
16 1:00 PM or 6:00 PM. There's two showings. It
17 will be, I guess they call it the Flagship
18 Premium Cinema in Monroe. It's down by the
19 lakes. If you're interested to reserve and, for
20 yourself and a guest, you can call 845-291-2470.
21 And this information is on our website as well.
22 Anyone have any other announcements or anything
23 else we left out? Mention?

24 All right, next we'll just move into
25 the resolutions. Let's see, the first one we

1 have completed. The second one is 250029,
2 authorize issuance of facilities' use request
3 form to the Kiwanis Club of Washingtonville for a
4 small group cleanup of trash along the roads, New
5 Castle to Stone Ridge Developments, to be held on
6 Saturday, April 26, from 9:30 AM till 2:00 PM. I
7 have a motion.

8 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Motion.

9 STEVE PRESSER: Second.

10 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Donna and second
11 Steve. Any questions? Comments? And this is
12 the same format, same thing that they've been
13 doing all along. Their insurance forms are in
14 here as well, so everything is satisfactory. All
15 in favor?

16 BOARD: Aye.

17 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Motion passes
18 (indiscernible). Thank you very much.

19 Next is Resolution 250030 to appoint
20 the Village Board as lead agency regarding SEQR,
21 State Environmental Quality Review Act for their
22 comprehensive process. Can I have a motion?

23 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Motion.

24 STEVE PRESSER: Second.

25 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Motion, Donna,

1 second, Steve. Any questions? Comments? All in
2 favor?

3 BOARD: Aye.

4 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Passes 30 with one
5 absent.

6 (Crosstalk)

7 VINNIE: No, since you have it in front
8 of you, you don't need to read it out loud.

9 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Okay.
10 Thank you.

11 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Next is Resolution
12 250031, to authorize the issuance of a public
13 assembly permit for the Hook and Ladder for a St.
14 Patrick's family festival, to be held on Sunday,
15 March 2, from 10:00 AM to 6:00 PM behind the Hook
16 and Ladder parking lot area. Can we have a
17 motion? Can I have a motion so we can get
18 discussion.

19 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Motion.

20 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Thank you. Second?

21 STEVE PRESSER: Second.

22 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Thanks, Steve.

23 Okay, discussion. So, this is a first-time
24 event. I'll just start, I guess, and anybody can
25 bring anything into whatever. So, it's a family

1 event. There's really just kids' activities.
2 The Village parking lot would be closed. The,
3 all the businesses around the parking lot have
4 been advised a week or so ago. Everybody, no
5 complaints, everybody's okay with it. There'll
6 be vendor, a couple of vendor trucks. One is one
7 that's been all over the place, in most of our
8 events, is Cousins Maine Lobster and then there's
9 Fat Boy's Food Truck. Those will be doing, more
10 than likely, corned beef and cabbage and serving
11 out into their kind of back area, which has been
12 roped off. And they will be responsible for
13 security, people walking around, making sure
14 everything is okay. They'll be also taking care
15 of the garbage cans. Port-a-potties will be
16 delivered, there'll be two, to offload any, you
17 know, traffic and so forth, going into their bar
18 area. May's Field will be used for parking, and
19 they already have May's, or the town of Blooming
20 Grove's permission to utilize that. We are
21 waiting on their insurance forms. And she said
22 she'll probably have all of those by tomorrow.
23 She would drop them off. Let's see. The police
24 have been notified, obviously, (indiscernible)
25 and ambulance corps. There is no plan of having

1 anybody on site. There'll be no overtime from
2 our police department. They'll be stopping by,
3 you know, on a timely basis just to check in and
4 make sure everything is okay. There'll be no
5 drinking in the Village parking lot. And let's
6 see, what else? And the parking area for NYPAC
7 and Basin Bubbles will be utilized as part of the
8 area for this event as well. Let's see if
9 there's anything else. The Village, meaning us,
10 would be responsible, we give them more of the
11 red canisters, the garbage cans. And again, the
12 facilitators of this, the Hook and Ladder, will
13 be emptying the garbage cans, piling it up, and
14 then we can pick the stuff up on Monday if his
15 dumpster is full. Again, this is a first-time
16 event and, you know, they're, you know, the plan
17 was just to have a family, kid activity for St.
18 Patrick's Day, so it's, that's it.

19 (indiscernible) from the Board?

20 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO:

21 (indiscernible).

22 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Go ahead.

23 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO:

24 (indiscernible) security (indiscernible), what
25 type of security? Obviously, it's a big party,

1 right?

2 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, yeah.

3 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: There's
4 going to be a lot of drinking.

5 VINNIE: Not in the parking lot.

6 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Not in the parking
7 lot.

8 VINNIE: I don't know how you're going
9 to stop that.

10 SEAN: I don't know how you're going to
11 stop that either.

12 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: In
13 general.

14 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: We'll have some --
15 listen, they're responsible to make sure that
16 nobody's in the parking lot. This is a, more of
17 a family thing, right. They're going to have
18 kids' games, they're going to do all that kind of
19 stuff. So, I really don't think, you know, if
20 they wanted to have a bash, it'd be titled a
21 bash. But it's supposed to be a family thing.
22 So --

23 VINNIE: Seems to me it can get out of
24 control.

25 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: You know, we got to

1 watch --

2 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO:

3 (indiscernible).

4 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, if I had to
5 use the word bouncers, right, the old term,
6 they'll have guys in T-shirts, walking around to
7 make sure that everybody stays in the corral with
8 their food and stuff. And the rest of the people
9 will be in the parking lot area. And there'll be
10 barricades so no traffic can enter in through the
11 banks, so that everything is safe. Obviously, in
12 the beginning they'll be able to. Similar to
13 Whoville, similar to Witchingtonville, it's the
14 same thing. And it is on Sunday, not Saturday.
15 That kind of popped up earlier in the day. But
16 it is, it's Sunday. And we get all the forms
17 tomorrow, you know, the resolution will be
18 pending, all of that, before the event. And if
19 they don't, if it wasn't being delivered, then
20 the event doesn't happen.

21 VINNIE: It will.

22 SEAN: This is a great example, that
23 gentleman that sat, the resident that sat in the
24 back of the room at the last meeting -- how much
25 are we charging them? This is where you make

1 money. Charge them 500 bucks.

2 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: That is one of the
3 conversations we're having. We're not, we
4 haven't definitely made a decision yet, but we
5 are talking about it. And we're having a meeting
6 next week to talk about it and bring in some of
7 our businesses that have planned events, so that
8 we can get their angle and our angle and see, you
9 know, what we can do. Like, a lot of these
10 places, you know, Airbnb applications are \$200,
11 you know, we're considering application fee. And
12 one of the biggest headaches is security and
13 garbage, and that it doesn't cost us overtime.
14 They maintain it, they can bring it to a central
15 location and get rid of the garbage in their
16 containers, like Witchingtonville and Whoville,
17 they have that other company, OCD, and they come
18 in and they take the garbage away and there is
19 some left over that we pick up and we dispose of.

20 VINNIE: And what about the residents
21 that park there, that live there? Is there --

22 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Nothing. I mean,
23 they're on -- we tell the landlords, the building
24 owners, we ask them to notify any of their
25 tenants, that this event is happening, just like

1 with Whoville and any other event that's there --

2 VINNIE: I was of the understanding
3 that those parking spots along those buildings,
4 belong to those buildings, not the Village.

5 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: The parking --

6 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: In the
7 front or in the --

8 VINNIE: In the back.

9 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Some
10 (indiscernible) the back, because --

11 (Crosstalk)

12 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Most of the parking
13 lot in the back is us.

14 VINNIE: I agree, because those spots
15 along the --

16 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: There's five spots
17 to the left of the Basin, that were part of the
18 deal when we had, when the Village was given the
19 right of way and that building was built. To the
20 left side of the building is all Basin parking
21 lot. Anything in front of the dance studio is
22 the dance studio. Anything --

23 VINNIE: What about Amada's?
24 Martelli's?

25 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: That's a

1 interesting comment. And hopefully, we'll get an
2 answer on it, because we have a survey currently
3 underway, which will have monuments, so we know
4 exactly where the property lines are when we do
5 things like this. It's always been a given that
6 the people that live there --

7 VINNIE: But right now we don't know.

8 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Nobody knows.

9 VINNIE: All right.

10 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Nobody knows,
11 because I've asked, and I've asked for deeds.
12 And the more you dig on these deeds, some of them
13 are in the 18-, late 1800s. Like the Village
14 owns a right of way in between the two buildings,
15 that little, tiny driveway, I'll call it.

16 VINNIE: Yup.

17 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: We have a Village
18 right of way. But the property owners own that
19 space. But we have a right of way. So, you
20 know, so we're trying to figure that out.

21 VINNIE: So that's -- you're talking
22 about the right of way between --

23 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: One East Main
24 Street and the dance studio.

25 VINNIE: What about the right of way

1 between Martelli and the vacant lot, the
2 (indiscernible)? The walkway right there?

3 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: That I don't know.
4 We don't know (indiscernible) --

5 (Crosstalk)

6 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Used to be the
7 underpass?

8 VINNIE: Yeah, the underpass. Was that
9 a right of way (indiscernible).

10 SEAN: It was at one point, the only
11 way to get in.

12 VINNIE: The Village --

13 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: No, I mean the
14 driveway between the two buildings -- and I'm
15 investigating that now, because one of the
16 buildings is up for sale, is that -- our right of
17 way, obviously, for the Village. Because that's
18 the driveway in, you need two egresses. That's
19 the way in; you make your right, you're in the
20 parking lot. There's a lot of lines; the bank
21 did do a survey before they left, so there is a
22 pin all the way towards the stream, in the green
23 strip that's between their parking space and the
24 driveway of our Village lot. So, there is a pin
25 there to know where you are. But this, we have a

1 guy working on it now, and he's spent, I mean,
2 literally months. And he keeps spinning because
3 the more he digs, the more deeds he's finding,
4 and he is finding it difficult. Behind the
5 soccer shop you have Amada's, you have Leslie's
6 building, which has Amada's in it. And then
7 there's an empty lot. The empty lot consists of
8 Amada's and Leslie. He owns that. At the time
9 it was the attorneys' building, way back when.
10 So, he owns that lot. But where it begins and
11 where it ends, no one really knows, and that's
12 why I wanted to have it done, so if we ever were
13 going to do any work in there, we know exactly
14 where we are.

15 And it was always a given that the
16 rental people, based upon the owners of those
17 buildings, like the soccer shop, his people park
18 right behind his building, right. Anybody that's
19 above for the Hook and Ladder, parked along the
20 split rail fence, that's their parking spaces,
21 that's their property. Everybody else, as was
22 always described, you would park in the Village
23 parking lot. And when there's events, we ask
24 them, you know, to park either across the street
25 by May's Field, walk across, and that's what they

1 do.

2 VINNIE: Have we ever had an event
3 there, that we closed off all the lot?

4 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah.

5 SEAN: So, you said the municipal lot
6 is going to be closed for this?

7 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah.

8 SEAN: The whole municipal lot?

9 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah.

10 SEAN: Are the police going to be
11 involved in enforcement to open container law?

12 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Open the what?

13 SEAN: Open container law?

14 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, they're going
15 to be down there. We're not bringing anybody for
16 the overtime, but the officers we have --

17 SEAN: All the more reason we should be
18 charging these people, \$1,000.

19 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Like I said, we get
20 there, our plan is to try to get this implemented
21 when the new year starts April 1, then we'll have
22 those fees in place. Okay.

23 VINNIE: And who reached out to the
24 other businesses to see if it was okay? The Hook
25 and Ladder?

1 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: The management of
2 Hook and Ladder, yeah, John and Sandy.

3 VINNIE: So you're taking his word that
4 he reached out to everybody and it was okay with
5 them?

6 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah.

7 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: If they
8 weren't, we'd hear about it.

9 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: We normally come by
10 with the flyers --

11 VINNIE: We don't even know about it.

12 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO:
13 (indiscernible) Facebook.

14 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah.

15 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Not everybody is
16 on Facebook.

17 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Any other questions
18 from the Board?

19 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Just the
20 occupancy, the expected maximum -- I mean there's
21 really no way to judge. I think that's
22 (indiscernible).

23 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: The only way you
24 know is when you have your first one and see
25 where it goes from there. If you have 50, 60

1 people, and people like it, then potentially, you
2 have 100 next time. Who knows? You don't really
3 know. But you just, I don't know, take a stab at
4 it. That's why they're guessing maybe 100.

5 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Did they
6 say what kind of kids' activities?

7 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: There's going to be
8 pony rides, and some other things. I can get you
9 the game, but I -- specifically, which ones.

10 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: There's
11 no rain date because it's rain or --

12 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: No, it's rain or
13 shine.

14 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: It's rain
15 or shine?

16 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah. And if it's
17 too bad then they'll probably cancel. But there
18 is no rain date, no.

19 (Crosstalk)

20 VINNIE: That's all right
21 (indiscernible).

22 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: And again, this is
23 pending, you know, receiving the insurance and
24 all that additional documentation. Any other
25 questions? Or any other comments? If not, then

1 I'd like to take a vote. Steve?

2 STEVE PRESSER: Yes.

3 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Donna?

4 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: I say
5 yes.

6 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Susan?

7 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: No.

8 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Tom, yes. Okay.

9 All right, thank you very much. I will speak to
10 them tomorrow, get the additional information and
11 I'll advise the chief as well.

12 Moving forward, all right, onto
13 Resolution 250032, to authorize the issuance of
14 facility use request form for the Washingtonville
15 Little League and softball practice games to be
16 held on April 7 through July 5, Monday through
17 Friday at 4:00 to 9:00 PM, and Saturdays, 8:00 AM
18 to 9:00 PM at Woodfield Park. Can I have a
19 motion?

20 STEVE PRESSER: Motion.

21 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Motion, Steve.
22 Second?

23 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Second.

24 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Donna. Questions?
25 Comments?

1 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: One comment.

2 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Comment.

3 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: There is no
4 lighting at Woodfield Park (indiscernible), so I
5 believe that this should be till sunset, not 9:00
6 PM.

7 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: To be honest with
8 you, we can change that. But being a coach that
9 was there for many, many years, you are, if you
10 are the last game of that particular day, and it
11 is too dark to play, you call the game.

12 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: I understand
13 that. I'm just saying that should be reflected
14 in (indiscernible).

15 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Whatever. We can
16 change it, that's fine. It's just common sense;
17 you can't see the ball, you're not going to play
18 ball. But, so with the revision to change that
19 to, say, be it -- yeah, Monday through Friday or
20 Saturday to 9:00 PM will be changed to dusk.
21 Okay. We have a motion, we have a second. Any
22 other conversation? All in favor?

10 STEVE PRESSER: Motion.

13 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Donna. Questions?

14 Comments? All in favor?

15 BOARD: Aye.

16 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Motion passes
17 three-zero, one. Resolution 250036, to authorize

2 questions? Comments?

3 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: It's subject to
4 getting insurance?

5 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: (indiscernible)
6 attached --

7 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: I don't have
8 insurance on mine.

9 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: I'll doublecheck
10 mine just to make sure. Okay. With that one
11 pending, insurance and the writer, okay. All
12 right. So, we're just revising, ladies and
13 gentlemen, adding onto the resolution, for
14 pending insurance policy.

15 VINNIE: (indiscernible).

16 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: They could. We
17 receive pretty much all of their events for the
18 year and maybe they did put the insurance on one
19 of them, but let's just doublecheck and we'll do
20 it pending the insurance policy. Any other
21 questions, comments? All in favor?

22 BOARD: Aye.

23 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Motion passes
24 three-zero, one. Resolution 250037, to authorize
25 the Village Clerk to solicit bids regarding the

1 (indiscernible) skater project. Can I have a
2 motion?

3 STEVE PRESSER: Motion.

4 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Second?

5 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Second.

6 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Any questions?
7 Comments? All in favor?

8 BOARD: Aye.

9 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Motion passes
10 three-zero, one. Christine, if you could touch
11 base with (indiscernible) tomorrow morning,
12 please, have that conversation. Next is
13 Resolution 250038, to authorize the budget
14 transfers and amendments as necessary to affect
15 the transfers of funds and to pay Village
16 warrants. Have a motion?

17 STEVE PRESSER: Motion.

18 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Steve. Second.

19 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Second.

20 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Donna. Questions
21 or comments? Just a couple of notables. Let's
22 see, our monthly insurance, employee benefits
23 \$109,352.81. We've been going through a lot of
24 fuel, doing a lot of ploughing and so forth.
25 That's \$7,322.59; road salt, \$5,058.31, more road

1 salt, \$1,670.34, more road salt, \$3,424.57. So,
2 out of the Aid Fund is \$166,175.92. Out of the
3 Water Fund there is a total of just normal bills
4 from H2O, Frontier Communications, \$14,942.84.

5 And then, out of the sewer, notable,
6 paying off the roof, for the repairs of that was
7 \$157,904. And then the total was \$169,038.03.
8 Okay, with that being said, any other questions?
9 Comments? Yes, sir.

10 VINNIE: Bill (indiscernible),
11 Washington Boulevard. I have number four on the
12 announcements, I don't know if you've mentioned
13 that --

14 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Which one?

15 VINNIE: \$200 public assembly fee,
16 beginning (indiscernible).

17 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: We updated, we took
18 it off, Bill.

19 VINNIE: Oh, I'm sorry.

20 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: That's okay.

21 VINNIE: There is no fee
22 (indiscernible) --

23 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, we had the
24 (indiscernible) -- I'm sorry?

25 VINNIE: There's no fee?

1 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: No fee right now.
2 That's where I mentioned earlier it's under
3 discussion. So, I --

4 VINNIE: We just approved seven
5 different public assemblies. My question was,
6 are we collecting, you know -- six of the seven
7 occurred after the (indiscernible).

8 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah. Agree.

9 WOMAN 1: The resolution that you just
10 passed, number 32, that goes over the Fourth of
11 July weekend (indiscernible) in conflict with the
12 fireworks?

13 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: (indiscernible)
14 on the 5th.

15 (Crosstalk)

16 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: This is at
17 Woodfield.

18 VINNIE: 32, right?

19 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Woodfield.

20 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, that's at
21 Woodfield. So, we're going to be at Vern Allen
22 Park. That's good, good catch. Yeah, Sean.

23 SEAN: Now that spring is coming, is
24 there any plans being made to clean out the
25 outflows, catch basins, retention basins, all the

1 things that alleviate flooding in the Village?

2 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, the normal
3 cleanup will happen, as it normally does. So,
4 after, when spring finally gets here and it's
5 dry, the work that we did, a lot of work that was
6 done, I guess a few years ago, they went through
7 all the easements.

8 SEAN: The first piece that they did
9 was done wrong. They used a clawed bucket, which
10 created a lot of problems (indiscernible) broken.
11 And that's the main one going out. And that's
12 needed to be maintained. The culvert down at
13 Vern Allen, if you go down there, you'll see a
14 stone there to prevent water from coming out --
15 they're not at the end of that pipe, they're in
16 that drainage ditch. So, the water is being
17 blocked, but it's flowing over the top. If you
18 like, I'll take a walk down there with your
19 engineer or you, and we can look at it, and I'll
20 explain exactly what the problems are there.

21 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay.

22 SEAN: But it's going to get worse with
23 the rainy season. They need to clean out the
24 pipes underneath the two roads; they were never
25 done the last time. We've got that much silt,

1 because that's blockage.

2 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: We're working on
3 the storm management stuff, the MS4, and that's a
4 project and a half, so we're maintaining and
5 doing that work. And we're also working on the
6 sewer mains, to tape up, and we're planning the,
7 what's supposed to happen every year, is 20
8 percent of the storm drains or the sewer mains,
9 are supposed to be jetted,, so we're working on
10 that as well. And just figuring out the area so
11 we can create a spreadsheet so we know every year
12 where we've been and what -- and starting next
13 year, what needs to be done.

14 SEAN: What about the retention basin
15 by the beautiful viewing area on Ahern, where the
16 seats are?

17 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah.

18 SEAN: That used to get brushed on
19 twice a year. That hasn't been brushed on in 10
20 years. All you have to do is go look at the
21 trees that are growing there, and you'll know
22 that this stuff hasn't been cut in ten years.
23 Not massive, but about 10 years old. That needs
24 to be getting back to be done. That's a large
25 fire load when you have firemen; there's a lot of

1 dead grass in there, there's a lot of dead
2 everything in there. It needs to be cleaned out.
3 That used to get done twice a year.

4 And one more thing is sidewalks. The
5 same people don't plow the sidewalks. Do they
6 have to be told every time or do they get fined
7 after not doing it (indiscernible)?

8 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: They get the
9 violations.

10 SEAN: And what does that do to them?
11 Because I see, Arrowpoint Lane, that complex
12 there, didn't do it again.

13 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, well --

14 SEAN: (indiscernible) lights.

15 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: The day that you
16 had called, we were already out, going after the
17 Weathervane complex. We went after St. Mary's,
18 because their sidewalk wasn't done. There were a
19 number -- 59, 61, 62.

20 SEAN: (indiscernible) the road,
21 because two sidewalks were disgusting.

22 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah. Yeah, you
23 know, we appreciate everybody advising of what
24 they see too, because we are driving around and
25 making sure. So, just for official, you have

1 four to five hours after a snow event, to clean
2 your sidewalks and get rid of everything. If it
3 happens between 6:00 PM and 6:00 AM, there's a
4 little bit, obviously, of leeway so you can get
5 up in the morning, do your thing, and take care
6 of the sidewalks. If you don't do it, or the
7 event is where it's, like just recently, right,
8 get a little rain, flash freezes, every area that
9 you walk now is like walking on Alaska. But what
10 the really means at the end of the day is that we
11 don't expect you to shovel it because there's
12 nothing to shovel. But what we expect in the law
13 is that you are to put some type of material on
14 the ice and snow so it, there's some traction to
15 it. So, be it salt, be it kitty litter, be it
16 ash, be it something to that effect. The only
17 thing that the law doesn't want you to put down -
18 - and I haven't quite figured it out unless it
19 becomes slippery, is wood chips. So, it's there.
20 So, whatever materials you can put down to make
21 it non-slippery, that's what we need to do. And
22 right now, that's what we need to do, because
23 there's nobody chopping and sawing the amount of
24 ice and snow and layers of stuff that's been
25 going on for the last few days. So --

1 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: I do know, I can
2 tell you, Sean, because I was here, a complaint
3 came in, we didn't have a phone number for the
4 property owner. A letter was sent out that same
5 day. Two other properties, we had phone numbers.
6 The building inspector did call those property
7 owners and tell them, you have to clear it, or
8 you're going to get a fine.

9 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: But you know,
10 again, if you guys see something, please don't be
11 afraid, you know, not that anybody's going to be
12 afraid, but just, you know, let us know. It just
13 helps everybody at the end of the day and we
14 don't want anybody getting hurt, especially kids,
15 especially at 208 and 94. Yes, sir?

16 VINNIE: What happens if you're not
17 home during a snowstorm? Because this last one,
18 I was not home? Although, I don't have a
19 sidewalk on my...

20 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, if you don't
21 have a sidewalk, you're in like Flint.

22 VINNIE: But the driveway --

23 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Maybe you have a
24 really good neighbor with a snowblower. So --

25 VINNIE: Oh, I have one. I just wasn't

1 home.

2 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: You weren't home.
3 But I'm saying, if some, if your neighbor -- like
4 this last event, I have a number of neighbors
5 that are not -- they were sick, one guy was in
6 the hospital. So, me and my daughter went around
7 and we took care of four driveways. And you
8 know, just to be neighborly and help out. Maybe
9 I did your driveway. But yeah, I mean --

10 VINNIE: Okay, I just --

11 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Just try to help,
12 you know. It's a neighborly thing to do and, you
13 know, people are under the weather or whatever
14 the situation may be. But there's, I mean,
15 there's some leeway in there, right, at the end
16 of the day. But if you're not, I mean, and you
17 have a phone number for your neighbor, say
18 listen, I'm working, I won't be home for 12
19 hours, would you mind just helping me out a
20 little bit. It goes a long way. One of my
21 neighbors is in the city for the whole week and
22 that's her job. And so, we took care of her
23 driveway. She came home, it was clean as a
24 whistle. And she was very happy and said thanks,
25 so.

1 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: If you see any
2 of those handicapped rubbers damaged, could you
3 please send us a picture and let us know?
4 Because that property owner is going to be
5 responsible for replacing it if whoever they had
6 clean them up damaged them. Those are important
7 because when we redo paving and stuff, to get
8 part of our CHIPS reimbursement, we have to prove
9 that the handicaps were installed.

10 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Go to our
11 website and fill out an incident report and
12 (indiscernible) right to (indiscernible).

13 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, people are
14 using that system, the IM CARE system, it's on
15 the website, which is really --

16 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Helpful.

17 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- because we do, I
18 look at it, it's on my phone. As soon as it
19 comes across, you know, we're taking some kind of
20 action. So, it's good that everybody is using
21 it.

22 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO:
23 (indiscernible).

24 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: That's right, you
25 did reach out (indiscernible). Yeah, Paul?

1 PAUL LANG: Paul Lang, 10 Patriot Lane.
2 A couple of things. At the last meeting, I had
3 asked, when the Treasurer was here, and the
4 Board, about the -- I know the State recommended
5 monthly reports, but we said we were going to do
6 quarterly reports. At the last meeting, the
7 Treasurer stated that she did do quarterly
8 reports during the last, and you had it in your
9 letter that the Treasurer presented to the Board
10 and the public, quarterly. I didn't want to get
11 into a discussion at the meeting, but I went
12 back-- and I haven't missed many meetings, but I
13 went back and looked at the minutes and the
14 videos. I didn't see four budget reports. So,
15 I'm asking, tonight, can you, can we put it on
16 the calendar tonight, that the first meeting of
17 June '25, the first meeting of September 2025,
18 December 2025, and February 2026, we have a
19 comprehensive budget report on our calendar so we
20 don't miss them?

21 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Post it --

22 PAUL LANG: Post it on the calendar,
23 put it on the calendar.

24 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Post it on the
25 calendar, but we'll post it, probably, on our

1 website.

2 PAUL LANG: Well, like I said, last
3 year, I didn't see four. She said she did four.
4 I mean, the one she did -- and they have to be
5 comprehensive. They have to be the A Fund, and
6 the F and the D.

7 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, there'll be
8 an A, G, and F.

9 PAUL LANG: And it has to be
10 everything. Because the last one that she gave
11 here was just the A fund.

12 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right.

13 PAUL LANG: She had to come back two
14 meetings later for the F and the G.

15 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right.

16 PAUL LANG: So --

17 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: That's a, we had
18 mentioned that, I believe, at the last meeting,
19 the meeting before. So, it will be posted.

20 PAUL LANG: Okay. Because I don't
21 think we did it last year. She said we did.

22 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, last year was
23 rather difficult. I'm not even sure --

24 PAUL LANG: You said we did it though.

25 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: She --

1 PAUL LANG: You said we did it.

2 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: When she gave her
3 report, she was giving quarterly reports. The
4 times that we were doing financial updates --

5 PAUL LANG: Yeah?

6 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- that's when she
7 was doing them.

8 PAUL LANG: That wasn't really --

9 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: That wasn't
10 meaty enough.

11 PAUL LANG: Yeah, that wasn't a
12 quarterly report.

13 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay.

14 PAUL LANG: In my opinion.

15 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay.

16 PAUL LANG: The other thing is, we're
17 still selling water, right?

18 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yes, we are.

19 PAUL LANG: And the last meeting, on
20 the January 6 meeting, we're selling water,
21 starting January 7, 7:30 to 2:30, Monday to
22 Friday, and we increased the fee?

23 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yes.

24 PAUL LANG: Okay. Why were they down
25 there Saturday hauling water?

1 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: I don't know. Did
2 you see somebody there?

3 PAUL LANG: Huh?

4 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: What time did you
5 see somebody there?

6 PAUL LANG: 7:12.

7 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Seven...

8 PAUL LANG: 7:12 in the morning.

9 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: 7:12 in the
10 morning?

11 PAUL LANG: You know I got a photo,
12 right.

13 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: I hope so. I mean,
14 come on. You didn't forward it to us.

15 PAUL LANG: No, not yet.

16 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay.

17 PAUL LANG: Because I'm going to file a
18 FOIL, because I want to see if that water was
19 accounted for. You said that they were going to
20 be Monday to Friday. Now we got, again, I go
21 back to it, and I just want to reiterate, the
22 insurance person is in the room, we got people
23 that are non-employees entering the DPW, with
24 access to DPW area, with a key, driving 53-foot
25 tractor trailer in there. And it's

1 (indiscernible) .

2 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: I'll find out and
3 get back to you, Paul.

4 PAUL LANG: Exposes our liability. I
5 will submit the FOIL to Christine tonight.

6 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: I'm sorry?

7 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: H2O could have
8 somebody --

9 PAUL LANG: I'll submit a FOIL tonight
10 and I'd like to see the -- because you have to do
11 the photo, right, of the meter.

12 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Yes.

13 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Before and
14 after, yeah.

15 PAUL LANG: Before and after; contact
16 somebody in the Water Department.

17 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Correct.

18 PAUL LANG: I'd like to see if that was
19 done Saturday.

20 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: We all do. Yeah,
21 there wasn't, to my knowledge, going to be
22 anybody there. Unless somebody from H2O was
23 there on Saturday doing their --

24 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Weekend shift.

25 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- their weekend

1 shift (indiscernible) --

2 PAUL LANG: This was a truck. This was
3 a truck going --

4 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, I know.

5 PAUL LANG: And the other thing is, I
6 mean, after 45 years here, every time -- and I'm
7 on a circle, a cul de sac, and it's, when they
8 plow, they always plow, they come down and they,
9 you know, outside and they work their way in, not
10 the snow in the middle. Well, these last two
11 storms, they plowed very early in the morning,
12 like, you know, 4:00, 5:00 in the morning. I
13 heard them, but I didn't see them. But they're
14 coming right down the cul de sac, and they're
15 pushing up onto the property. Okay, not bad. I
16 got a couple of pictures of this too. But what's
17 going to happen when they do that? They're going
18 to knock the curbs out. One curb by me already
19 has a chip; they chipped it. It's just not going
20 to be a good ending. I don't know why they don't
21 -- maybe we got a lot of new guys in the DPW?

22 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: No.

23 PAUL LANG: But rather than going
24 around and pushing it into the middle, they just
25 -- and they hit it pretty hard. You could see

1 where they hit it pretty hard. They're going to
2 knock the curbs out. I got all kinds of
3 blacktop, and they're creating more work because
4 I got 4-inch pieces of black, 4-inch thick, where
5 they just dug them out as they were plowing. So,
6 you know, what's -- now you're creating more work
7 where you got a -- it's more money to repair
8 curbing, repair potholes that you created. So, I
9 don't know if it was somebody just different,
10 because, like I said, 45 years they've done it
11 different and then the last two storms we had --

12 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: It was a different
13 process. So, what we try to do, we have, like
14 shopping malls, and you see them on front
15 loaders, the really wide plows. You familiar
16 with what I'm talking about?

17 PAUL LANG: Yeah, yeah, I know what you
18 mean.

19 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: So, that's what we
20 were doing, I'm not sure this storm, but the
21 storm you probably, whatever you're talking about
22 is when we used it. So, what they were doing to
23 save putting the trucks on the road to take care
24 of the bigger roads, we were using this plow to
25 manage and take care of the cul de sacs. That's

1 why you're not seeing the snow piled up into the
2 middle; the plow is pushing the snow --

3 PAUL LANG: Yeah, but it's going to
4 damage the curbs. It's going to damage the
5 curbs.

6 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, I mean, if
7 they're hitting the curbs, absolutely. I mean,
8 they shouldn't be whacking the curb, and we'll
9 talk to Chris tomorrow and find out what, you
10 know, what the story is.

11 PAUL LANG: Yeah, you can come up --

12 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: It's a time saver -
13 -

14 PAUL LANG: -- you can see it's still
15 there. And also, the one that they did, I take
16 pride in cleaning my hydrant out, in front of my
17 house. One of the piles was very close to the
18 hydrant. Why are you going to pile snow by the
19 hydrant?

20 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: That's right.
21 You're right. Good info. We'll bring it back
22 and talk to the guys. But that's why it was
23 looking different. Okay. Yeah, Vinnie?

24 VINNIE: Questions. I know a while
25 back, are we staying on top of (indiscernible)

1 with the streetlights?

2 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah.

3 VINNIE: Because I, I made the
4 notification last year, in the beginning of the
5 year. They came in June. They came, they looked
6 at it, they put some red tape around it, and
7 left.

8 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Around what, the
9 pole?

10 VINNIE: Yeah. Red tape is still
11 there, light's still out.

12 SEAN: Union job.

13 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: What's the
14 location?

15 VINNIE: (indiscernible) block.

16 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: With a red --

17 VINNIE: I submitted it three times.

18 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: It's a never-
19 ending battle with them.

20 VINNIE: No, I'm just saying,
21 (indiscernible) that light that's not work.

22 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah. No.

23 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: I agree 100
24 percent. They need to take care of their
25 product.

1 VINNIE: And are we switching? Are
2 they eventually going to switch out the lights,
3 have all LED? Because there's still some more
4 whites out there.

5 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, we've been
6 asking for LED. We've been really not getting a
7 response. And there's a program out that we're
8 investigating, I'll call it, where O&R is now,
9 potentially, selling the light poles -- and it's
10 not the light poles, but it's the lights, to the
11 municipalities. And I'm digging in, trying to
12 just get some information on this and see how
13 this works. There's a number of communities that
14 are already doing it. And some of the cost-
15 savings is they charge you for the lights, and
16 then they also, as I understand, waiting for the
17 documentation, but they also charge you for the
18 maintenance of the light.

19 So, if it sounds like it's the
20 municipality that takes over the responsibility
21 for the light, and just the light, then the
22 maintenance fees go away. And then some
23 municipalities have saved tens of thousands of
24 dollars because now they're not paying it. So,
25 I'm trying to get that information from different

1 municipalities and O&R. And there is a company
2 spearheading it that, you know, I guess, somehow
3 is involved in the process and is probably making
4 money. But trying to get the, you know, get the
5 whole picture. But it's a pain the rear end. We
6 know it. We, when someone calls and they put a
7 ticket in, if I'm not calling twice, I'm calling
8 three times, to shake them to do it. Our police
9 department, somewhat even on a monthly basis,
10 when they're driving around at night, if they see
11 it, they put a list together, they send it to
12 Chris Martino. He emails the website to report
13 issues, and it's just a matter of them getting
14 out and doing it, either themselves, or they use
15 subcontractors. But it is a ridiculous process
16 and very slow. So, yeah. We're as frustrated as
17 everybody else when you have to -- talking about
18 a damn lightbulb. And then changing it from
19 iridescent to a tube to an LED. It's just a
20 matter of them -- and I'm not sure, I got a
21 feeling they're dragging their feet a little bit
22 because they want to be able to have the
23 municipalities buy these, you know, buy the
24 lights. But I understand if you do that, then
25 everything becomes LED. So...

1 VINNIE: One more question. 30 days
2 till spring.

3 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yay.

4 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Not here yet, no
5 way, not there yet.

6 VINNIE: Coming.

7 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: I know.

8 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: She called. I
9 called. And we're going to have a conversation.
10 We have weekly calls with our attorneys. This
11 week we're -- I'm not sure, because Chris is on
12 vacation.

13 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Is on vacation
14 this week.

15 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: So, he's in the
16 sun.

17 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: By the pool.

18 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: So, I'm not sure we
19 can get Brian on the phone, but it's a high
20 priority with a number of things to get moving
21 on, or get them moving on. We're just waiting on
22 them. Anybody else?

23 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Going once.

24 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Thank you, Kevin.
25 Motion to adjourn.

1 DEPUTY MAYOR DONNA JACARUSO: Motion to
2 adjourn.

3 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Can I have a second
4 please?

5 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Second.

6 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: All in favor?

7 BOARD: Aye.

8 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Motion passes 3-0,
9 one. Thank you very much, everybody.

10 VINNIE: Thank you.

11 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Safe going home.
