Village of Washingtonville Board Meeting  
June 16, 2025

1           ALL: I pledge allegiance to the flag  
2           of the United States of America, and to the  
3           republic, for which it stands, one nation, under  
4           God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for  
5           all.

6           MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Thank you all for  
7           attending our Monday, June 16th meeting. As we  
8           have discussed, Leslie is here to give an update  
9           on our budget. And we'll open by having a motion  
10          to open the public hearing for local law amending  
11          Chapter 260 (indiscernible) street and sidewalk  
12          cafes.

13          TRUSTEE VERNON COLEMAN: Motion.

14          MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: And a second?

15          TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO: Second.

16          MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: All in favor?

17          ALL: Aye.

18          MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: The motion passes,  
19          five, zero. Okay. Continuation from our last  
20          meeting, I don't know if there's any new  
21          questions or anything along those lines. Our  
22          attorney has checked out some of the legal things  
23          that were discussed at the last meeting.  
24          Everything seems to be in line.

25                 If it has to do with the liquor

1     licensing, that's part of the New York State Law,  
2     which would be followed. The Building Inspector,  
3     again, will be involved in the process to make  
4     sure that handicapped accessibility is available,  
5     and that all the rules and regs per the local law  
6     will be followed. So, again, I didn't know if  
7     there was any other questions. I don't know if  
8     there's any questions from the Board. Okay.

9             Okay, and with that, I think we have a  
10    motion to close the public hearing.

11            MAN 1: Yes, one question. Did you  
12    establish a fee (indiscernible)? Did you  
13    establish a fee?

14            MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: For the permit?

15            MAN 1: Yeah.

16            MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Or actually, no, we  
17    did not. Not at this point, no. Well,  
18    (indiscernible) -- I don't remember.

19            BILLY: You can do it by resolution  
20    afterwards. I believe the local law lets you set  
21    it by resolution. That way we don't have to have  
22    subsequent local laws every time we put a change  
23    in the structure.

24            MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right, and if we  
25    need to change it or modify it, we know what

1 we're doing. But we did see there were a number  
2 of, I think Vinnie brought up the comment about  
3 charging for the outside usage. There were a  
4 bunch of different laws that were out there.

5 There was one that they were charging  
6 by the chair, and some kind of like by the table,  
7 some square footage. And the Board really hasn't  
8 decided we want to move in that direction, to be  
9 honest.

10 So, we'll continue to review some of  
11 these laws and have these conversations, and  
12 we'll make a resolution. And if the Board  
13 decides that they want to charge a fee for  
14 restaurants and so forth using the outside  
15 sidewalks. Can I have a motion to close the  
16 public hearing?

17 TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO: Motion.

18 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Can I have a  
19 second?

20 DEPUTY MAYOR STEVE PRESSER: Second.

21 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Second is Steve.  
22 Any other questions or comments? All in favor?

23 ALL: Aye.

24 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Motion passes five  
25 to zero. Thank you very much. Okay. Next, I

1 would need a Motion to Open the Public Hearing  
2 for Local Law Amendment, Chapter 297, Village  
3 Law, Code of Order. Can I have a motion?

4 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Motion.

5 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Sue. Can I have a  
6 second?

7 TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO: Second.

8 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay. All in  
9 favor?

10 ALL: Aye.

11 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: The motion passes.  
12 All right. So, this has been long awaiting.  
13 Vinnie, you must have some questions? No  
14 questions?

15 VINNIE: Everything I've said  
16 (indiscernible).

17 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay, passed. So  
18 for just edification purposes, the reason for  
19 this law is to allow a resident to install a  
20 second meter in their home that would be used to  
21 bypass water going into the home. It would be  
22 used for outside watering only.

23 And the reason for that is that you  
24 would not be charged any sewer rate. So for  
25 watering your lawns, washing your cars, X, Y, and

1 Z --

2 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: No second  
3 facility use fee, either.

4 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: And it would --  
5 yes. And of course, it would be a second  
6 facility's fee. So (indiscernible) --

7 MAN 1: It would or would not be used?

8 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Would not.

9 DEPUTY MAYOR STEVE PRESSER: Would not.

10 MAN 1: Would not, okay.

11 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: You're strictly  
12 charged for the water you use.

13 WOMAN: For the water.

14 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right.

15 MAN 1: Okay. (Indiscernible).

16 BILLY: Just like the State, it's going  
17 to be a win-win for the Village. It saves the  
18 Village residents money.

19 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Mm hmm.

20 BILLY: The Village in turn will make  
21 more money on water because residents will be  
22 inclined to use their water now to water their  
23 lawns instead of getting charged that sort of  
24 fee.

25 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Thank you.

1           MAN 2: I have a question. Is there  
2 like -- right now, it's 7,500 gallons, I think.

3           TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: There's no  
4 minimum.

5           MAN 2: There's no minimum on that?

6           TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: No minimum. The  
7 only thing is that there have to be measures in  
8 place so you can't backflow it into the house and  
9 bypass it.

10          MAN 2: That makes sense.

11          TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: The resident  
12 will have to pay the cost of the meter. And if  
13 our guys have to do any labor for it, they're  
14 going to have to pay for that, too. It will be  
15 charged alongside their regular water bill. In  
16 the past, there's a couple of commercial  
17 properties that have irrigation meters. They had  
18 a separate account set up.

19                 With our new software, we don't have to  
20 do that. We can set it up in there for separate  
21 irrigation meters.

22          BILLY: So, just for clarity, if  
23 somebody's main meter is under the minimum, and  
24 the agricultural one puts them over, is a portion  
25 of that still applied to the minimum?

1 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: No. No.

2 BILLY: So, the agricultural is a 100  
3 percent take.

4 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: It's metered  
5 separately.

6 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah.

7 BILLY: Even if you use only 50 percent  
8 of the regular minimum meter for it?

9 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: It -- we read  
10 the meter. We bill by the meter.

11 BILLY: That means there's no -- it's  
12 not a combined bill?

13 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: No. It doesn't  
14 get comingled.

15 BILLY: It's a separate -- all right.

16 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Good question,  
17 though, Billy.

18 BILLY: That's what I'm here for.

19 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: And you're the  
20 best.

21 MAN 2: So, what would be the price for  
22 100 gallons or 1,000 gallons on those?

23 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Well, the 1,000-  
24 gallon price would be the same.

25 MAN 2: The same, okay.



1 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: The \$6.37 per  
2 thousand.

3 MAN 2: Okay.

4 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay. Any other  
5 questions? Any questions, comments from the  
6 Board? Susan, I'd like to thank you for taking  
7 us through, and Chris --

8 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Chris --

9 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- as well, on the  
10 attorney side of things, getting it all done and  
11 wrapped up. Thank you.

12 Okay. If there's no other further  
13 questions, is there the flavor to close the  
14 public hearing at this point?

15 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: I see no reason  
16 not to.

17 DEPUTY MAYOR STEVE PRESSER: Yeah.

18 MAN: Yeah.

19 WOMAN: Yeah.

20 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay. Can I have a  
21 motion to close the public hearing.

22 TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO: Motion to  
23 close.

24 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Do we have a  
25 second?

1 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Second.

2 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Any questions or  
3 comments? All in favor?

4 ALL: Aye.

5 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: And the motion  
6 passes, five to zero. Okay. So, for our next  
7 meeting, we'll have a -- we'll need a resolution  
8 just to pass that, right?

9 MAN 2: We can just do it by oral  
10 resolution.

11 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: That would be all  
12 right?

13 MAN 2: Yeah, absolutely.

14 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay, that's fine.  
15 Okay. Next would be just a review of our first  
16 quarter '25-'26 financial update from Leslie.  
17 Unfortunately, Murphy's Law, we can't get the hot  
18 top to communicate to the overhead predictors, so  
19 we gave everybody some printouts, and Leslie will  
20 run through this through the budget process.

21 BILLY: And I've got a good seat to see  
22 the screen.

23 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Maybe that's the  
24 problem. Couldn't move the seat.

25 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: Okay, On

1 the first page of the presentation, again, this  
2 highlights the '25-'26 budget year. Just a note,  
3 the '24-'25 year, the audit's going to start  
4 probably within the next few months, so I'm not  
5 here tonight to present the results of that.

6 I am planning on being here for the  
7 last Board Meeting in July to give an unaudited  
8 presentation for the fiscal year in 2025. And  
9 just a note, the 2024 audit has been finalized.  
10 It was finalized on June 5th, and I think it is  
11 posted on our website, along with the rest of the  
12 audit reports, '23, '22, and '21 that have been  
13 done this past year and a half.

14 So for the presentation tonight, again,  
15 it's for 2025-2026. The first slide is on the  
16 general fund revenues. I just highlighted some  
17 of the major revenue sources the Village  
18 receives, first one being property taxes. The  
19 adopted budget, \$5,393,550. That was the tax  
20 levy. We received \$5,176,565. We've collected  
21 about 95 percent of the tax levy.

22 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Oh, him.

23 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: Oh, sorry.

24 MAN 1: We (indiscernible), it's not  
25 (indiscernible) --

1                   WOMAN: (Indiscernible) printed it out  
2 -- (indiscernible) you sent?

3                   TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO: Yeah, it's two  
4 pages. Double sided.

5                   WOMAN 1: We double sided it.  
6 (Indiscernible) come out. Okay, we'll run some  
7 more. We double sided it.

8                   MAN 1: And we don't have a revenue  
9 page.

10                  TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: Yeah, it's  
11 double-sided.

12                  MAN: We don't have them.

13                  WOMAN: We don't have them.

14                  WOMAN 1: All right. I'll get it for  
15 you.

16                  WOMAN: (Indiscernible) I have  
17 (indiscernible).

18                  MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Oh, I guess  
19 everybody has --

20                  MAN 2: (Indiscernible).

21                  TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Somebody want  
22 this one?

23                  MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: It's very  
24 consistent.

25                  MAN 2: Oh, wait a minute.

1 WOMAN: (Indiscernible).

2 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: I guess so.

3 (Indiscernible) we have a choice.

4 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: All right.

5 General fund expenditures? You guys have that?

6 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Everybody have

7 that?

8 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: You have

9 that?

10 MAN 2: Yeah.

11 BILLY: We've got that.

12 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: All right.

13 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: Okay.

14 Again, just highlighting the major categories.

15 Your general support, that includes your Village

16 Hall expenses, the insurance. So, the total

17 budget was \$910,000. To date, we have spent

18 \$331,000.

19 Public Safety, which is your police and

20 your building department. The adopted budget was

21 \$2.7 million. Actual to date -- actually through

22 May 31st is \$585,000. Transportation, which

23 includes PPW, adopted budget, \$1,094,000. We've

24 spent \$260,000 to date.

25 Culture and recreation are the parks,

1 budgeted at \$79,250. Actual is \$20,553. Your  
2 home and community services, which is the  
3 beautification around the Village. We budgeted  
4 \$33,000. Actual to date, \$2,767. Then, we have  
5 your employee benefits, which is your retirement  
6 expense. Your health insurance, dental  
7 insurance, life insurance, budgeted at  
8 \$2,072,000. Actual to date, \$440,000.

9 The next slide is water fund  
10 expenditures. You have your water operations  
11 budgeted at \$120,000. Actual through May is  
12 \$5,380. Your administrative, now that includes  
13 all the payroll and the contractual expenses,  
14 budgeted at \$648,000. Actual is \$114,461.

15 You have your water purification, we've  
16 budgeted \$155,000. Through May 31st, nothing has  
17 been spent yet. Water transmission wells,  
18 \$207,500. Actual through May is \$81,212. And  
19 your employee benefits budgeted at \$200,416.  
20 Actual is \$32,575. Your sewer fund expenditures.  
21 Operations, total adopted budget was \$1,271,760.  
22 Actual to date, \$154,285. And your employee  
23 benefits, \$198,916. Actual to date, \$32,578.

24 WOMAN: (Indiscernible).

25 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: For the

1 detail for this presentation, within the next  
2 week, I am going to post on the website a more  
3 detailed report that's going to get generated  
4 from the accounting software.

5 So then you can see what these -- so  
6 this is an overall presentation. So, I'm going  
7 to give you a detail of what's in each category  
8 and in each line so that you can see budget to  
9 actual in all the categories. Again, that'll be  
10 probably in the next week or so.

11 MAN 1: I have a quick question on the  
12 water.

13 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: Yeah.

14 MAN 1: How is it that we spend nothing  
15 on water purification? (Indiscernible) --

16 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: The  
17 (indiscernible) bill's coming up.

18 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: It damn  
19 sure is.

20 MAN 1: What is the timing  
21 (indiscernible)?

22 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: The timing  
23 of bills coming in?

24 MAN 1: Yeah.

25 BILLY: But they are purifying? It's

1 just (indiscernible) --

2 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Yeah.

3 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: Yeah.

4 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Yeah. We're  
5 about to have one of the tanks cleaned. There  
6 are two of the tanks that you're cleaning, right?

7 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, yeah, that --  
8 that's a little bit on the side of things. But  
9 the -- like, the purification, I'd look at that  
10 as being all the chemicals. So, when they ship,  
11 it's kind of like, on a quarterly basis.

12 BILLY: Yeah.

13 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: So, that actually  
14 we're just paying the name of the company is  
15 Slack, for better or worse. But Slack is coming,  
16 I just saw some invoices coming in. So, that'll  
17 be registered on the next pay --

18 BILLY: All right.

19 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- and will be  
20 included. But yes. And what Susan was  
21 mentioning is that from our DOH inspection, one  
22 of the things that needs to happen on a -- I  
23 think it might be every Friday here, but we need  
24 to inspect our towers, the water towers.

25 So, with that, I mean, we just went out



1 to get some bids. We got one for, I think,  
2 \$2,400. Another one came in at nine -- a little  
3 over \$9,000. And we reached out to a few other  
4 companies that did not respond.

5 So, what they do is, they actually put  
6 diving suits on, and they go inside the tank,  
7 inspect it from the inside out. So that will be,  
8 obviously, probably under purification, just from  
9 a sense of inspections.

10 BILLY: Okay.

11 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay.

12 MAN 1: This is on a cash basis, not on  
13 an accrual basis, right?

14 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: This right  
15 now is on a cash basis.

16 MAN 1: On a cash basis --

17 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: Yeah, the  
18 books are maintained on an accrual basis. But  
19 right now, this is just the first quarter. So,  
20 this is cash basis.

21 MAN 1: Can I ask one more question?

22 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: Sure.

23 MAN 1: When you compare the finances  
24 as of early in the first quarter, weren't the  
25 accruals accounted in that?

1           TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: Well, I  
2 just got the audit entries, too, for 2024. So,  
3 that's still -- I'm still cleaning up the year-  
4 end stuff, yeah.

5           MAN 1: (Indiscernible) that's a  
6 separate issue because this is just this fiscal  
7 year's expenditures, so anything that's an  
8 adjustment of last year is not going to be in the  
9 expenditures. It's going to be in the capital  
10 expenditures. (Indiscernible) from last year  
11 would be (indiscernible), right?

12           TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: Correct.

13           MAN 1: All right. So, the reason I  
14 ask is because (indiscernible) \$510,000  
15 (indiscernible) and we spent already 36 percent  
16 of that.

17           TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: I'm sorry, which  
18 one are you on?

19           MAN 1: (Indiscernible) status report.  
20 \$910 is budgeted. We've already spent 36 percent  
21 of that. The (indiscernible) --

22           TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: It's  
23 mostly salaries --

24           MAN 1: -- (indiscernible) and --

25           TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: This is

1 salaries.

2 MAN 1: Okay. But still, would it be  
3 prepaid, some of our expenses and they're not  
4 referred as prepaid or --

5 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: No  
6 (indiscernible).

7 MAN 1: So, that means that we've  
8 already paid for something that -- yeah, let me  
9 rephrase that. Is this the expected amount at  
10 this date? Is (indiscernible) \$331, the expected  
11 amount we spent in the budget as of May 31st, or  
12 is there --

13 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: That's  
14 what spent to date. That --

15 MAN 1: Okay. I know that's what spent  
16 to date, is that what's expected to be spent to  
17 date?

18 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: Correct.  
19 Yes, it is.

20 MAN 1: So, this budget is  
21 (indiscernible) and (indiscernible) here, and  
22 (indiscernible) should have a certain exposure  
23 (indiscernible) amount. So this \$331 you have,  
24 is it expected to be paid, or is, you know, are  
25 some things paid in advance of their actual --

1                   TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: No,  
2                   there's nothing paid in advance. This is actual  
3                   cash out --

4                   MAN 1: Okay. So, what you're saying  
5                   is cash, I'm saying it's cash, but so nothing  
6                   that's paid in here -- there's nothing about the  
7                   insurance policy or anything like that that's  
8                   covered over -- that's covered in a 12-month  
9                   period, so --

10                  TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: No, not  
11                  yet.

12                  MAN 1: (Indiscernible) get the entire  
13                  --

14                  TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: We didn't  
15                  get the insurance bill yet.

16                  MAN 1: Oh, okay. But you have accrued  
17                  the insurance, but if you know you're going to  
18                  get insurance --

19                  TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: Correct.

20                  MAN 1: You would've approved it?

21                  TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: Correct.

22                  MAN 1: And that's not in here?

23                  TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: That's not  
24                  in there, no.

25                  MAN 1: Okay. Okay. Thank you.

1 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Any questions?

2 BILLY: Public safety, though, do we  
3 have an estimate with the finalized lease  
4 contract where that's going to land in the  
5 budget?

6 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, we budgeted  
7 the amount that is due retro, so that three  
8 percent is budgeted.

9 BILLY: In that number right now, or --

10 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: That's not  
11 in -- well, it's in the budget, it's not in the  
12 actual yet.

13 BILLY: So, we -- do we know where  
14 that's going to land yet, or --

15 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: We're actually  
16 calculating all that out since we're approving  
17 the MOA this evening to, you know, figure out how  
18 much goes to each person based upon longevity and  
19 everything else that goes on for each employee,  
20 yeah.

21 BILLY: Okay. And the (indiscernible)?  
22 We only got -- we only represented -- we only got  
23 the market payment. That was it?

24 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: (Indiscernible)  
25 payment (indiscernible).

1 BILLY: I would hope so. It's June.

2 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: No, June hasn't  
3 been billed out yet.

4 BILLY: Okay. April, May?

5 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: We got  
6 April.

7 BILLY: Oh, we did? We did get it.

8 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: Well,  
9 yeah, we got it in June. This is, again, through  
10 May 31st.

11 BILLY: Okay.

12 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: So, yeah.  
13 That's why I made a note here. We got April and  
14 June, so we need -- we're owed May and then  
15 obviously (indiscernible). Does everyone have --  
16 they have their revenues now?

17 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, we got them.

18 BILLY: Yeah.

19 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: Okay.  
20 Obviously, if he's asking a question. All right.  
21 So then I'll just go back to the first page,  
22 general fund revenues.

23 Property taxes, again, adopted budget,  
24 \$5,393,550. Total collected to date, \$5,176,965.  
25 Sales tax, \$1,170,000. We got one quarter in for

1     \$280,000. Fines and forfeitures, which is the  
2     Justice Court, budgeted at \$90,000. We've  
3     received \$25,817. That represents just March and  
4     April, so we're still owed May. The franchise  
5     fees is \$107,000. To date, we've collected  
6     \$98,806.

7                 For the Washingtonville Central School  
8     District SRO, we budgeted \$275,000, and we've  
9     received \$53,353. Again, that represents March  
10    and April. In the building department, we  
11    budgeted \$55,000, and to date, we've collected  
12    \$24,484, and that represents three months.

13                Water revenues, our first billing was  
14    \$201,935. We've collected \$89,249,000. And as  
15    we just mentioned, the bulk water, we've billed  
16    out \$41,562 and collected the March payment of  
17    \$19,788.

18                For sewer, the billings for the sewer  
19    and facility were \$442,614, and we've collected  
20    \$212,034.

21                MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Any other  
22    questions?

23                MAN 2: Well, the bulk water is what?  
24    Water sales?

25                MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: It's Finland.

1 BILLY: It is Finland? Just Finland?

2 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: No.

3 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: And if there's  
4 anybody else that is partaking in  
5 (indiscernible), yes.

6 BILLY: Like the town?

7 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Like the town.

8 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: I just  
9 wanted to make a note with the Deficit Financing  
10 Bond. We're closing out the bond on June 25th.  
11 We actually -- from New York State, were able to  
12 borrow for eight years.

13 We reduced that period of time to five  
14 years, so we're saving on interest earnings, and  
15 the interest that we got ranged between 4.5 and  
16 4.75 percent. So, there's a significant savings  
17 the village is getting, just by reducing the life  
18 of the bond instead of eight year, over the five  
19 years. And we're borrowing \$1.16 million,  
20 originally the \$4.4.

21 BILLY: Can I ask you a question on  
22 that? When we originally started about the \$4.5  
23 million or \$4.4 million. I think part of the  
24 increase in our taxes was to pay that note. Now,  
25 will our taxes be going down, since we are not



1 going to be -- we're going to be returning that  
2 money, apparently? And get \$1.4 --

3 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, well, we're  
4 at one point where we had -- the last round, we  
5 borrowed \$2.6. So, that's going to get paid  
6 back, and we're borrowing the \$1.160. And that  
7 will be spread across five years and divided  
8 amongst all the residents and businesses.

9 BILLY: But I think you would show a  
10 payment that we're going to have for at least 10  
11 years on the \$4.5. That's what -- is that going  
12 to be lower, or is that going to be the same  
13 because you're going for a lower term?

14 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: It's -- a lower  
15 term at \$1.160. So, when we had the \$4.4, we got  
16 right to the point that got paid back. Then we  
17 reduced it to \$2.6, that got paid back, and now  
18 we're at the point of a final borrow because now,  
19 going through all the audits, we're at a point  
20 where we know where the delta is, and it's the \$1  
21 million, 160.

22 And that, rather than doing it over 10  
23 years, we've already kind of more or less paid  
24 two years already, which said, okay, you could do  
25 eight, but to save on the interest and everything

1 else that would be coming out of our pockets over  
2 eight years, we felt that five years was a decent  
3 delta. We looked at four, got a little rich,  
4 five was a little long, four seemed to be the  
5 sweet spot, and that's where we wanted to go.  
6 So, it'll be five years and at the \$1 million  
7 160.

8 BILLY: But the increase you put in the  
9 taxes that you said we'd have for 10 years to pay  
10 the \$4.5, is that going to be reduced? I'm  
11 trying to find out what the tax burden is going  
12 to be on -- is it going to be lower, or is it  
13 going to be left the same?

14 WOMAN: (Indiscernible) --

15 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: Well, the  
16 -- yeah, the payment's going to be lower now.

17 MAN: Lower.

18 MAN: It should be lower.

19 BILLY: Okay. So, what is that going  
20 to do for our taxes? Is that going to be kicked  
21 back to us, or low -- not kicked back, but say  
22 we're going to lower our taxes?

23 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, it's going to  
24 be the same thing that we've been doing over the  
25 last two years. We had a tax increase for just

1     general purposes, right? But then, there was  
2     that additional payment that needed to be done to  
3     take care of the bond --

4             BILLY: Correct.

5             MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- right? So,  
6     it'll be the same situation, but just over five  
7     years, but it will be less.

8             BILLY: That still doesn't -- is that  
9     going to lower our taxes? Whether it's -- so  
10    it's less --

11            MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: What's lower --

12            BILLY: -- but what are we -- what are  
13    you doing with that money that you don't need?  
14    Are you going to not raise our taxes?

15            MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: No, I think we're  
16    talking maybe two different things here. I mean,  
17    you --

18            BILLY: Well, if you said you're taking  
19    \$300 a -- we'll use that as a number, \$300 a year  
20    for 10 years. Now, you only need \$200 a year for  
21    five years.

22            MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right.

23            BILLY: Where's the other \$100?

24            MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: In your pocket.

25            BILLY: That's right, so you're going

1 to lower it, then?

2 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Correct.

3 MAN: (Indiscernible) --

4 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yes, that portion  
5 of it -- right, rather than paying \$300 or \$400 a  
6 year, that dollar amount's now going to be  
7 whatever it is spread amongst all.

8 MAN 1: Okay. So, we probably won't  
9 see a tax increase this year and you'll just keep  
10 the money?

11 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Not a fair  
12 question. We haven't done the budget yet.

13 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: No, no, no, no, no.  
14 See, I think we got ourselves in that problem  
15 last time, so guaranteed an increase --

16 WOMAN: (Indiscernible) --

17 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- but what we're  
18 trying -- listen, we went from 22, 23 percent,  
19 now we were at 15. The plan is, we cut that in  
20 half and get it down to between five and seven,  
21 we'd be happy as hell.

22 MAN 1: Okay.

23 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: You know? And then  
24 the bond payment, it's a little bit extra, but,  
25 you know, we'll see where it lands at the end of

1 the day. And like I said, the reason to go over  
2 the budget when we post this stuff is, you know,  
3 at the end of the day, we're not -- if it breaks,  
4 we need to fix it, you know? And there are  
5 projects that just need to be done.

6 Like we spent on -- we have a company  
7 that we wanted to, we actually ended up using  
8 today. I don't remember what it was, because we  
9 deemed it as an emergency job, but your  
10 (indiscernible) sinkhole, right? And we had a  
11 company go out there to do a water investigation  
12 because we couldn't water detect an issue.

13 So, in that case, you know, normally,  
14 again, DPW would bring -- we're doing everything  
15 in-house we can. We'll borrow the equipment.  
16 We'll work with the town. We'll work with  
17 Cornwall and the Windsor, Maybrook, whoever it  
18 is, to get projects under our belt and doing them  
19 all in-house. We're saving hundreds of thousands  
20 of dollars. (Indiscernible) --

21 MAN 1: (Indiscernible) storm?

22 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: And then the best  
23 part, you know, hopefully, when we get to the  
24 numbers, we'll actually see maybe for the first  
25 time in many years there'll be a small fund

1 balance that we can now start to grow on and put  
2 that money aside and dedicate it to potentially  
3 trucks or whatever the -- you know, whatever we  
4 need, wherever we need to put that money.

5 Or, we just sock it away, and it's, you  
6 know, it's a penny saved. And we get a little  
7 bit of money, and we have this bank called New  
8 York Class; interest rates are between four and  
9 five. The money that comes out of that interest-  
10 wise is huge.

11 So, we'll start to maybe call it an  
12 investment. But it's -- you know, there's  
13 finally some light at -- through the trees.

14 MAN 1: All right.

15 BILLY: So, the new bond's going to be  
16 about \$300,000 a year?

17 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: Yeah, the  
18 first payment, which is due in --

19 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: \$190  
20 (indiscernible) --

21 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: \$263,000.

22 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: \$263,000.

23 BILLY: \$263,000?

24 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, that's within  
25 interest.

1                   TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: And that's  
2 lumped in (indiscernible) --

3                   BILLY: Is that for (indiscernible)?

4                   TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: Yeah, it's  
5 only going to be five-year.

6                   BILLY: No, but I mean, is it the first  
7 year 12 months, or is it --

8                   TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: No, it's a  
9 full year --

10                  BILLY: (Indiscernible) --

11                  TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: -- a full  
12 year, yeah.

13                  BILLY: Okay.

14                  TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: It ranges  
15 from \$263,000 to \$266,000 (indiscernible).

16                  BILLY: Okay. For the first  
17 (indiscernible)?

18                  MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay. All right.  
19 Thank you, Leslie. I appreciate it. Okay. And  
20 the portion now is on Public Comment on Agenda  
21 Items if anyone has anything? Yes, sir?

22                  MAN 2: What exactly is the cow bridge?  
23 Is it the old stone arch, or is it the new square  
24 --

25                  MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Which one, sir?

1           MAN 2:   The cow bridge.

2           MAYOR TOM DEVINKO:   Oh, the cow bridge,  
3   okay.   So, the cow bridge is ours.   That  
4   (indiscernible) --

5           MAN 2:   Which one is it?

6           MAYOR TOM DEVINKO:   Which one --

7           MAN 2:   Is that the old stone bridge?

8           MAYOR TOM DEVINKO:   Yeah.   The one  
9   that's -- the one that you had noted that there  
10   was some blockage on it --

11          MAN 2:   Yeah.

12          MAYOR TOM DEVINKO:   -- a couple weeks  
13   ago?   Yeah.

14          MAN 2:   Okay.

15          MAYOR TOM DEVINKO:   Both the cow  
16   bridge, stone bridge, whatever you want to call  
17   it --

18          MAN:    (Indiscernible) --

19          MAYOR TOM DEVINKO:   -- that's ours.

20          MAN 2:   Okay.

21          MAYOR TOM DEVINKO:   It starts there,  
22   and then there's a sliver of property that runs  
23   up behind Revere, and the other side is showing  
24   it to be Blooming Grove, and then the rest of it  
25   to the left would be the homes that are on



1 Revere.

2 So, when I dug into it a little bit and  
3 asked, so DO -- Department of Transportation,  
4 when they were doing that reworking of that  
5 intersection, basically wanted to do a detailed,  
6 historic findings of what that thing was, where  
7 it came from. I don't even know what's behind  
8 it, but they wanted an historic evaluation of it.  
9 At the time, the Town of Blooming Grove said no  
10 because the timeframe in order to do that would  
11 have delayed the project.

12 So, they've foregone the figuring out  
13 the cow bridge history, and then they went right  
14 into the project. So potentially, I want to say  
15 that's why the cow bridge is still there, and if  
16 we wanted to entertain thinking about something  
17 with that, then we would have to do an historic  
18 research and figure out where that thing came  
19 from and is there any historic value to it.

20 MAN 2: I asked my work representative  
21 for the last three years to find out about them,  
22 and he's come up with zero.

23 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, just -- what  
24 I just said is what I got out of the plans, and  
25 Supervisor Drahlman was the head of the project

1 from a municipality standpoint, so I had a couple  
2 of conversations with him.

3 MAN 2: He stated to me it was Old  
4 Route 94 Bridge, Mr. (Indiscernible).

5 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: I don't know.

6 MAN 2: (Indiscernible) --

7 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Like I said, just a  
8 project, you know?

9 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Are they going  
10 to deem it historic or (indiscernible)  
11 information on that?

12 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, I mean, it's  
13 something that we could go (indiscernible) about  
14 and set her loose on it and see what she can come  
15 up with, just so we know what we have.

16 MAN 2: But if it's affecting  
17 properties?

18 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Do you --

19 MAN 2: (Indiscernible) --

20 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: The only property  
21 that I'm aware of that it's affecting is us. I  
22 don't see anything uphill being disturbed because  
23 all that water that comes down and it hits that  
24 retention basin funnels through, goes under Avon  
25 Boulevard, hits the drainage ditch, and then

1 comes down through Vern Allen and then through  
2 the three pipes, the single pipe to the three  
3 pipes, and then (indiscernible). There's no  
4 homes that are being affected by that thing right  
5 now.

6 We have homes being affected by things,  
7 but it was due to the construction of where --  
8 how and what they did with the drainage, storm  
9 drains, for that project. They didn't put a  
10 couple in.

11 So, every heavy rainstorm, we have to  
12 go out and help the residents that live there  
13 because their properties are now getting flooded.  
14 A couple of them are getting water in their  
15 basements. So, at the end of the day, I'm  
16 sending the overtime bills and everything else to  
17 DOT. I'm going to draft a letter tomorrow and  
18 tuck it all away and send it out to a  
19 representative.

20 Because one way or the other -- and I'm  
21 going to send copies tomorrow and (indiscernible)  
22 is, and, you know, saying this is really stupid.  
23 You know, there's a problem with this project  
24 right out of the box when it was done, and you  
25 send your hydrologist on to Project A, B, C, D,

1 E, and F, and A is a problem, so come back, fix  
2 it, and then go on. And that's the drum we're  
3 beating right now. So, that's the chapter.

4 All right. Any other general  
5 questions? Or otherwise, I'll just jump into the  
6 points. Some of this stuff was on our previous  
7 meeting. We have identified the handicapped  
8 ramps. We're ordering the ones that were, just,  
9 you know, uprooted off of the concrete, so all of  
10 that will be taken care of. Knights of Columbus  
11 was out there last Saturday or the Saturday  
12 before now doing their topsoil and seed.

13 We have reached out to a couple of  
14 companies to actually test the dirt. It's  
15 amazing how many companies aren't that -- you  
16 would think they were out there, but they aren't,  
17 and the price to test some dirt is in the  
18 neighborhood, one quote that we have received is  
19 between \$5,000 and \$6,000, so we are trying to  
20 find somebody else out there that does that type  
21 of work, because we're definitely in the wrong  
22 business.

23 TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO:  
24 (Indiscernible).

25 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, it's crazy.

1 But, again, the Knights were out there, and they  
2 did seed and do everything they needed to do with  
3 that, so that was good.

4 We have been in contact, waiting for  
5 some callbacks on that little area within the new  
6 court, center court, where there is some water  
7 pooling, so there will be more to come on that.  
8 The bridge has -- the stone has been moved,  
9 repaired. The area that was washed out has been  
10 refilled, so that's in good shape.

11 We did bring to the attention on the  
12 Village E-Code that they're working on that now,  
13 trying to get those two books merged at the end  
14 of the day, and we need to have probably a call  
15 to get down to the nuts and bolts on that, so  
16 that'll be scheduled.

17 And this coming Saturday, over at the  
18 Veterans Square area, 29 West Main Street, there  
19 will be Senator Skoufis and one of the local  
20 banks, they're sponsoring a shredded day from  
21 Saturday, the 21st, between 9:00 and 12:00, so if  
22 you have anything you need shredded, bring it  
23 down, and they will -- they'll take care of it.  
24 They'll shred it.

25 Also, something that didn't make it to

1 the agenda, it just kind of popped in, but I'm  
2 mentioning this. This is on Saturday, June 28th,  
3 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m., the VFW is having a  
4 Commemoration Day, 2025, at the VFW Post 8691.  
5 It's regarding Memorial Day and Flag Day  
6 tributes. The Washingtonville ROTC will be on  
7 hand to display Honor Guard colored maneuvers,  
8 drills, stars and stripes history, flag-folding  
9 demonstrations. There'll be some live music,  
10 lawn games, 50-50. There'll be hot dogs and  
11 refreshments, et cetera. So, if you're  
12 interested, there are tickets. You could reach  
13 out to Tracy L. at 845-597-7126.

14 And this is also behind the scenes,  
15 it's sponsored by Black Rock Fish and Game Club.  
16 So, if you can make it, please try to get there  
17 and support your VFW. Does anybody on the Board  
18 have anything else?

19 TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO:

20 (Indiscernible).

21 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Sure, go ahead.

22 TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO: Not much to  
23 say about it, but I believe it was the 14th of  
24 this month there was an automatic lift at the  
25 building moratorium.

1                   MAN 3:   Sometime around that date.   I  
2   don't know the exact date.

3                   TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO:   We don't have  
4   an exact date.   It is an automatic lift, and we  
5   are no longer in the building moratorium.

6                   WOMAN:   I couldn't hear that?   Could  
7   you repeat it?

8                   TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO:   We are no  
9   longer in the building moratorium.   It was an  
10   automatic lift.   We, for some reason, are having  
11   difficulty confirming the exact date, but I  
12   believe it was the 14th of this month.

13                  WOMAN:   Thank you.

14                  TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO:   So, as of this  
15   Monday, we are no longer in the building  
16   moratorium.   You know, the last meeting, we had -  
17   - (indiscernible) and zoning were adopted because  
18   you weren't here.

19                  MAYOR TOM DEVINKO:   Thank you.

20                  TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO:   You're  
21   welcome.

22                  TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI:   (Indiscernible)?

23                  MAYOR TOM DEVINKO:   Sure.   Go right  
24   ahead.

25                  TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI:   Okay.   So, to

1 date, we've installed 260 of the new meters. I  
2 can tell you this month so far, just on the new  
3 meters alone, over a million gallons of water  
4 have been used, because we can track that now. I  
5 know there are people in this audience who have  
6 not called in to get their new meters yet.

7 TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO: They know when  
8 you flush your toilet.

9 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Yeah, literally,  
10 I mean, I'm calling -- I have to write sometimes  
11 on a Saturday, and I'll call people, and I'm  
12 like, you have a leak. And they're like, what?  
13 And I'm like, you have a leak, because I can see  
14 it, that you're running water constantly for 24  
15 hours. And one guy called back and said, my hose  
16 was running, and I didn't even know it. So, they  
17 do work.

18 Collections are a little bit slow on  
19 what we're receiving compared to what we're  
20 billing. So, come August, we're going to send  
21 out a collections letter. We did this last year  
22 for the re-levy, and within two weeks, we've  
23 brought in over \$80,000 worth of revenue.

24 So, to keep it more steady, because  
25 approximately a third of the residents don't pay



1     their water bill for whatever reason. So, the  
2     idea is to try and generate a more steady flow of  
3     income, rather than waiting for re-levy time to  
4     get all that money (indiscernible).

5             MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Anything on --  
6     Vernon, anything on grants you want to mention?

7             TRUSTEE VERNON COLEMAN: At the moment,  
8     no.

9             MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: No, okay.

10            TRUSTEE VERNON COLEMAN:

11     (Indiscernible), I'm sorry.

12            MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, no worries.

13            TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO: Well, we have  
14     a meeting on Wednesday --

15            TRUSTEE VERNON COLEMAN:  
16     (Indiscernible), we'll do that before.

17            TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO: Yeah. It's a  
18     big one.

19            MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: All right. We'll  
20     jump into the resolutions. Resolution 25-0099 to  
21     Adopt a Memorandum of Agreement with the full-  
22     time police and police dispatcher contract. Do I  
23     have a motion?

24            DEPUTY MAYOR STEVE PRESSER: Motion.

25            MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Steve. Can I have

1 a second, please?

2 TRUSTEE VERNON COLEMAN: Second.

3 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Vernon. Questions,  
4 comments? All in favor?

5 ALL: Aye.

6 WOMAN: Do we need roll call for that,  
7 or --

8 MAN 3: Yeah. I would roll call this  
9 one.

10 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: All right. Let's  
11 do a roll call. Vernon?

12 TRUSTEE VERNON COLEMAN: Yes.

13 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Susan?

14 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Yes.

15 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Tom? Yes. Donna?

16 TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO: Yes.

17 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Steve?

18 DEPUTY MAYOR STEVE PRESSER: Yes.

19 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay. So, the roll  
20 call motion passes five to zero. Thank you very  
21 much.

22 Resolution 25-0100 to approve  
23 Pittsburgh Tower Group to internally inspect  
24 Village water tanks at Prides Crossing and  
25 Clinton Drive for a cost not to exceed \$2,440,

1 and we kind of explained a little bit about that  
2 earlier. Can I have a motion, please?

3 TRUSTEE VERNON COLEMAN: Motion.

4 DEPUTY MAYOR STEVE PRESSER: Second.

5 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Second from Steve.

6 Any other questions, comments? All in favor?

7 ALL: Aye.

8 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Motion passes five  
9 to zero. Thank you. 25-0101 to approve AccuData  
10 as the new Village time clock and payroll  
11 processing vendor at a cost not to exceed \$12,000  
12 per year. Can I have a motion?

13 DEPUTY MAYOR STEVE PRESSER: Motion.

14 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Steve. And a  
15 second?

16 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Second.

17 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Susan. So, we're  
18 changing our process a little bit here, or quite  
19 a bit, because everything that's been done  
20 previous has been done manually.

21 From the time clock system that you're  
22 getting a report, then that information is put  
23 down on paper, and then from there we go to a  
24 person that does the payroll, and that would then  
25 get entered into a system called ADP, and all the

1 reporting that comes out of the back end that we  
2 need to send up to New York State was all manual.

3 So now, this process will be all  
4 integrated into the system so that when reports  
5 need to be sent up, Leslie doesn't sit there and  
6 does every single employee figuring out -- and  
7 these reports aren't there, so she needs to  
8 figure out how much is going where, to what, to  
9 who, and now all that stuff will be done through  
10 integration with the payroll system and the time  
11 clock system. So, it will be a much smoother  
12 process. So, we'll get that moving as quickly as  
13 we can. Okay. And if you don't mind making  
14 that contact tomorrow?

15 TREASURER LESLIE TILLOTSON: Sure.

16 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Perfect, thank you.  
17 All right. So with that, we have that. That was  
18 a comment. So, any other comments from the  
19 Board? All in favor?

20 ALL: Aye.

21 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: The motion passes  
22 five to zero. Next is 25-0102 to approve  
23 facilities request form for Hudson Valley  
24 Softball Clinic to be held from July 7th through  
25 August 28th on Tuesday, Wednesdays, and Thursdays

1 from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. at Woodfield Park.

2 Do I have a motion?

3 DEPUTY MAYOR STEVE PRESSER: Motion.

4 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: All right, Steve.

5 Donna, I'll get you at second?

6 TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO: Second.

7 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Any other

8 questions, comments? All in favor?

9 ALL: Aye.

10 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: The motion passes

11 five to zero. Excuse me?

12 TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO:

13 (Indiscernible).

14 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay, thank you.

15 Resolution 25-0103 to approve the free document

16 Shredded Days sponsored by Senator Skoufis to be

17 held on Saturday, June 21st from 9:00 a.m. to

18 12:00 p.m. at Veterans Memorial Square. Do I

19 have a motion?

20 DEPUTY MAYOR STEVE PRESSER: Motion.

21 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Steve. Second?

22 TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Second.

23 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: (Indiscernible).

24 Questions, comments? All in favor?

25 ALL: Aye.

1           MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Motion passes five  
2 to zero. Thank you. Resolution 25-0104 to adopt  
3 Local Law Number 2 of the year 2025 amending  
4 Chapter 260 of the Village Code street and  
5 sidewalk, sidewalk cafes. Can I have a motion?

6           TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO: Motion.

7           MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Donna put on the  
8 motion. Can I have a second, please?

9           TRUSTEE VERNON COLEMAN: Second.

10          MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Vernon. Any other  
11 questions, comments? All in favor?

12          ALL: Aye.

13          MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: The motion passes  
14 five to zero. Resolution 25-0105 to adopt Local  
15 Law Number 3 of year 2025 amending Chapter 297 of  
16 the Village Code for Water. Do I have a motion?

17          TRUSTEE SUSAN WALSKI: Motion.

18          MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Susan. Second?

19          TRUSTEE VERNON COLEMAN: Second.

20          MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Vernon. Questions,  
21 comments? All in favor?

22          ALL: Aye.
