So, we did receive from the New<br/> 17 York Conference of Mayors a request for<br/> 18 signature.<br/> 19 And actually it's an email response,<br/> 20 but there are three bills that are out there to<br/> 21 support the EMS, Ambulance Corps and so forth<br/> 22 that are out there. And they're all positive in<br/> 23 a sense for EMS departments, and how they can be<br/> 24 exempt.<br/> 25 For an example, there's one that's an</p> |

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| <p style="text-align: right;">Page 6</p> <p>1 834.S31, which provides toll exemptions on New<br/> 2 York State thruways for emergency vehicles,<br/> 3 enabling faster emergency response. It's hard to<br/> 4 believe that an ambulance for that service would<br/> 5 have to stop and potentially pay tolls.<br/> 6 There's another, which is A80.86 and<br/> 7 S7501, requires county, cities, towns, and<br/> 8 villages, collaboratively, to develop a<br/> 9 Comprehensive County EMS System Plan to assess<br/> 10 needs, identify service gaps, and guide future<br/> 11 investments.<br/> 12 And the third is 821.77, and an S1515,<br/> 13 which excludes EMS expenditures from real<br/> 14 property tax cap, giving municipalities the<br/> 15 flexibility to properly fund the EMS services<br/> 16 without compromising other critical needs.<br/> 17 So, everyone's had that. So,<br/> 18 (indiscernible), with your permission, I will<br/> 19 electronically sign that and get it back up to<br/> 20 the Governor's desk, so we are showing our<br/> 21 support for the emergency family out there.<br/> 22 All right, so number two, we recently<br/> 23 had a printer, or a lease was ending on our<br/> 24 copiers; one here and one at the Police<br/> 25 Department. They have been changed out and the</p>             | <p style="text-align: right;">Page 8</p> <p>1 That was safety purposes, because<br/> 2 sometimes, when we have Court in here, the Court<br/> 3 is asked to, or the people in the audience, are<br/> 4 asked to leave while something is going on in the<br/> 5 court. And while they're out there, there could<br/> 6 be 15 to 20 to 30 people standing in the lobby<br/> 7 area, and we're here kind of late. So, it makes<br/> 8 sense that the doors were protected and we have a<br/> 9 FOB for the front door.<br/> 10 And so, we have software, we know when<br/> 11 people are running out. We also have another<br/> 12 security system that was also put in there with<br/> 13 other technologies. So, that's good. And it's<br/> 14 running -- everything is going well.<br/> 15 Chief, I wanted just to put on there<br/> 16 that, you know, your grant that you got several<br/> 17 months ago, probably in the early spring, that<br/> 18 the two police cars are coming along; one is just<br/> 19 about complete with a paint job, you know,<br/> 20 stickers, lights, and all that good stuff. And I<br/> 21 think the other one is not far behind that.<br/> 22 So, hopefully, we'll be able to have<br/> 23 these two new vehicles on the road. Probably<br/> 24 going to retire one, and the better of both, one<br/> 25 of those cars we're going to use down here at the</p> |

And thanks to<br/> 2 Vernon, we did get a better deal with paying<br/> 3 less, so, with newer equipment, and that's a good<br/> 4 deal. So, thank you, Vernon for getting that<br/> 5 done.<br/> 6 Let's see. The new -- we discussed<br/> 7 over the last couple of meetings, this Accu Data,<br/> 8 which is timeclocks and a payroll system. We had<br/> 9 our kickoff meeting last week, and we -- it's<br/> 10 actually a pretty fast process.<br/> 11 These guys have done -- this company,<br/> 12 Accu Data, has done this before, plenty of times.<br/> 13 So, our go-live, actually, will be on August 1st<br/> 14 of 2025. They're doing a lot of work.<br/> 15 Currently, they'll be running a parallel test in<br/> 16 the payroll system to make sure, obviously, all<br/> 17 the numbers work out, etc. And we do have some<br/> 18 training online tomorrow with the Accu Data<br/> 19 trainers. So, real good progress on that. And<br/> 20 again, we'll be live on that system in August.<br/> 21 We also did a security, door security<br/> 22 system upgrade in this building, with FOB<br/> 23 technology, which is basically a little touch<br/> 24 device. So, it pretty much covers the interior<br/> 25 doors in our lobby area.</p> | <p style="text-align: right;">Page 9</p> <p>1 Village Hall if we need it for any business. DPW<br/> 2 was short a vehicle, so we gave them both<br/> 3 building inspector's car that we were using, so<br/> 4 that the DPW Superintendent has been primarily<br/> 5 driving that around. And we'll see where that<br/> 6 goes. Okay?<br/> 7 And Department of Public Works, CDL<br/> 8 training. So, some good news on this part for<br/> 9 the last -- since we got into office, we've found<br/> 10 that the number, if not all, except for maybe two<br/> 11 guys, did not have their CDL license in place.<br/> 12 And happy to report that now, I think<br/> 13 we have three or four that are in the screen<br/> 14 pipeline, to get their CDLs. Angel just actually<br/> 15 passed his air brake test. And so, technically,<br/> 16 he's able to drive larger trucks and B-class-type<br/> 17 of licenses.<br/> 18 So, we're very happy that the guys have<br/> 19 stepped up and taken that big step, and now we<br/> 20 can look forward to getting away from pickup<br/> 21 trucks and start going to the larger dump trucks<br/> 22 that will help us tremendously during projects,<br/> 23 paving, whatever else we're doing in-house, and<br/> 24 also helping other municipalities, as they also<br/> 25 help us in larger projects. Who are you<br/> 2 using for a (indiscernible) provider?<br/> 3 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: I think there's a<br/> 4 couple, and I don't know, but I think there's one<br/> 5 like, in Newburgh. I don't know the name offhand<br/> 6 though.<br/> 7 PAUL LANG: How much would it take?<br/> 8 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: It varies on the,<br/> 9 what they're taking. Because the air brake test,<br/> 10 I think I just saw an invoice, it was like \$30-<br/> 11 something. There was another one for another<br/> 12 test, it was like \$65.<br/> 13 PAUL LANG: For the ELD training?<br/> 14 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: For the CDL<br/> 15 training.<br/> 16 PAUL LANG: Entry-level driver<br/> 17 training, they got everything --<br/> 18 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: No, whatever they<br/> 19 need to do is what they're taking.<br/> 20 PAUL LANG: Are you getting prices on<br/> 21 it, because that's a lot of money. I'm just<br/> 22 (indiscernible) --<br/> 23 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, so far, the<br/> 24 stuff that we've seen come back, we only know of<br/> 25 two schools.</p>  | <p style="text-align: right;">Page 12</p> <p>1 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Hard to believe,<br/> 2 but it -- and some of it might have been towards<br/> 3 the salary, but we -- as, you know, when you have<br/> 4 a CDL, there is a kick in your hourly rate. So,<br/> 5 you know, as an incentive to get the licenses.<br/> 6 And then the guys will be here.<br/> 7 PAUL LANG: Just as a suggestion, what<br/> 8 we used to do in the bus company, when I was up<br/> 9 in -- Gallagher, we used to train them to be bus<br/> 10 drivers, train them to get their CDL.<br/> 11 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right.<br/> 12 PAUL LANG: After they got their<br/> 13 license -- because it's an expensive license --<br/> 14 we -- the company kept, if they had -- if they<br/> 15 didn't have their passenger and school bus<br/> 16 endorsement, it would be one price. And if they<br/> 17 didn't have any CDL at all, it would be another<br/> 18 price.<br/> 19 It would hold back, basically making<br/> 20 them pay -- it was free training. We would hold<br/> 21 back that money and it would go towards the cost<br/> 22 of the training. Why should we be paying for the<br/> 23 training to do the job? Or, you know what I'm<br/> 24 saying?<br/> 25 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah.</p> |
| <p style="text-align: right;">Page 11</p> <p>1 PAUL LANG: It's only \$30 for the test,<br/> 2 but (indiscernible) the test --<br/> 3 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: That's right.<br/> 4 PAUL LANG: -- but that's not the<br/> 5 complete -- that's not the required -- complete<br/> 6 required (indiscernible) that the federal law<br/> 7 requires now.<br/> 8 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: So, what prices<br/> 9 would you determine?<br/> 10 PAUL LANG: Oh, per person?<br/> 11 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, like \$2,500?<br/> 12 PAUL LANG: (Indiscernible) --<br/> 13 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay. Yeah, we<br/> 14 were in the \$2,500 range. But I could get the<br/> 15 name of the company that we're using.<br/> 16 PAUL LANG: Yeah, maybe that's why we<br/> 17 should require that as a -- as I mentioned<br/> 18 before, require the CDL as additional support.<br/> 19 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, the next<br/> 20 round it will. All these guys were pretty much<br/> 21 here. We did hire somebody who has a CDL. So,<br/> 22 that is the standard now, that we want CDLs. And<br/> 23 it's, in some cases, when we were applying, we<br/> 24 weren't getting anybody with a CDL.<br/> 25 PAUL LANG: Yeah.</p> | <p style="text-align: right;">Page 13</p> <p>1 PAUL LANG: Why should we be paying<br/> 2 \$3,000 to have -- to hire this person, to get him<br/> 3 his CDL? Why are we doing that?<br/> 4 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, again, most<br/> 5 of these guys have been here several years,<br/> 6 probably doing (indiscernible) --<br/> 7 PAUL LANG: I think a lot of guys we<br/> 8 hired didn't have CDs -- you just said that.<br/> 9 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Right, I know. And<br/> 10 that's -- now we're trying to get them to the<br/> 11 point --<br/> 12 PAUL LANG: (Indiscernible) --<br/> 13 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: -- to get them<br/> 14 their CDLs. And then, as an incentive, and to<br/> 15 get a bump in their salary. If they didn't take<br/> 16 the class and they don't have a CDL, you know --<br/> 17 all the guys we have here are very good, but we<br/> 18 want everybody to have their CDL, so that it just<br/> 19 makes sense, like we did years ago. And then, it<br/> 20 fell off and then all of a sudden, we were<br/> 21 hiring, and hiring guys with just D licenses, no<br/> 22 CDL.<br/> 23 PAUL LANG: And I'm just saying that<br/> 24 they should be paying for that CDL license.<br/> 25 TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO: But there are</p>                     |


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| <p style="text-align: right;">Page 14</p> <p>1 companies out there that once they hire<br/>2 employees, that continuing education, it's a perk<br/>3 of the job.<br/>4 PAUL LANG: Okay, continuing. But this<br/>5 is not continuing, this is initially getting<br/>6 their CDL license.<br/>7 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: And I often wonder,<br/>8 too, because I pass this bus company up in New<br/>9 Windsor, and during the summer months, or last<br/>10 year or something, they were giving sign-on<br/>11 bonuses for like, almost \$6,000. So --<br/>12 PAUL LANG: Not (indiscernible) --<br/>13 they're not \$6,000.<br/>14 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Well, what -- I<br/>15 don't know if they own the lot across the street,<br/>16 but there was a banner.<br/>17 PAUL LANG: They (indiscernible) --<br/>18 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: It was substantial<br/>19 money. And, but you know, that's the route we<br/>20 went, because again, at this point, we felt it<br/>21 was a good incentive for these guys to do it.<br/>22 You know, and they have to stay with us<br/>23 at least two years. They can't jump. We don't<br/>24 get their training and they move on. So, we've<br/>25 got them for two years, and then you want to go?</p> | <p style="text-align: right;">Page 16</p> <p>1 for their A license, right, not even their B,<br/>2 because then you can drive tractor trailers and<br/>3 every other thing.<br/>4 PAUL LANG: Mm hmm.<br/>5 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: So, and if you ever<br/>6 get into a situation where we have a tractor<br/>7 trailer, you can drive it. Like, two of our<br/>8 guys, or actually one, Steve, is a -- he's an A-<br/>9 class driver. So, if we had a reason to, he<br/>10 could drive it. So, yeah, it's good.<br/>11 All right. Next, on the Billing<br/>12 Department, monthly, bi-monthly status reports.<br/>13 Would you like to give it or would you like me to<br/>14 --<br/>15 TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO: Well, just for<br/>16 the month --<br/>17 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: This is half the<br/>18 month of July.<br/>19 TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO: Every two<br/>20 weeks, they put out the building (indiscernible)<br/>21 an update on revenue. So, for this month, there<br/>22 were seven building permits issued, 10 COs, two<br/>23 violations, one municipal search, and no fire<br/>24 safety inspections. The amount that was brought<br/>25 in, collected, was \$1,187. So, that said, that's</p>                       |
| <p style="text-align: right;">Page 15</p> <p>1 It's a -- you know, great, do what you got to do<br/>2 to make yourself happy, and be successful<br/>3 (indiscernible) --<br/>4 PAUL LANG: Is that in the contract?<br/>5 Is that contractual --<br/>6 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah.<br/>7 PAUL LANG: -- for two years?<br/>8 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah. So, and you<br/>9 know, but again, the last two years, they've been<br/>10 -- there really wasn't, for whatever reason, not<br/>11 a lot of interest in it. And to<br/>23 tell you the truth, and I don't know -- I know<br/>24 what the major difference is, but if -- whatever<br/>25 the cost is, too, but a lot of guys were going</p>                 | <p style="text-align: right;">Page 17</p> <p>1 not the average.<br/>2 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: No.<br/>3 TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO: I took the<br/>4 last five months or so, added them up, divided,<br/>5 and we average about \$5,350-ish a month --<br/>6 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Okay.<br/>7 TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO: -- in revenue.<br/>8 That's why we're going to require safety<br/>9 inspections, because since we did our IMA with<br/>10 Blooming Grove, they came in, September-ish, and<br/>11 went full force and got them all done by around<br/>12 February-March, completed. And it<br/>13 (indiscernible) had not been done in years.<br/>14 So, now every business will annually<br/>15 get a fire safety inspection. So, the next round<br/>16 should still be starting around September-<br/>17 October. We have a (indiscernible) \$91,000 in<br/>18 the Building Department, or so.<br/>19 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: Yeah, that's been<br/>20 fees that -- we came in, I think there was a<br/>21 couple of hundred dollars in that account. I mean, it's an advantage to have than<br/> 3 have not.<br/> 4 TRUSTEE DONNA JACARUSO: Absolutely.<br/> 5 MAYOR TOM DEVINKO: All right. Thank<br/> 6 you very much. All right, an update on the<br/> 7 playground equipment for Memorial Park. The<br/> 8 ground has gotten to a position where we can<br/> 9 finally start to dig the holes for the mounting<br/> 10 brackets and everything else that needs to be<br/> 11 done, the sonic tubes for the playground<br/> 12 equipment. So, with weather permits, we should<br/> 13 have the other two new pieces of equipment<br/> 14 installed by Friday. So, things are moving in the right<br/> 22 direction on that.<br/> 23 Orange and Rockland Utilities. Came<br/> 24 across this streetlight manager person, and we<br/> 25 started to have a conversation about, you know,</p>  | <p style="text-align: right;">Page 20</p> <p>1 that needs to go into it. There's a lot of --<br/> 2 Wallkill did it, Village of Warwick, I believe,<br/> 3 did it.<br/> 4 And they were able to save -- I can't<br/> 5 say it's a substantial amount of money, but<br/> 6 they're saving money. Because every streetlight<br/> 7 that we have, regardless if it's on or off, we<br/> 8 pay for, and that's why it's important, if you do<br/> 9 see a light out, to say something.<br/> 10 And when the light's -- you know, the<br/> 11 other thing is they use a premium on maintenance.<br/> 12 They charge you a maintenance fee on the light<br/> 13 just for the sake of having that in your pocket<br/> 14 at some point down the road if they have to<br/> 15 change a bulb.<br/> 16 So, you know, the streetlights are on,<br/> 17 everything's fine, but we're still paying<br/> 18 maintenance on this stuff, which is really what<br/> 19 would go away at the end of the day. So, we'll<br/> 20 keep you apprised of what's going on with that.<br/> 21 Also, we're expecting, in probably<br/> 22 three weeks, a draft of our Village Employee<br/> 23 Handbook. And again, Vernon worked really hard<br/> 24 on it, so it was really good stuff, company is<br/> 25 very well prepared. They've done this a lot.</p> |
| <p style="text-align: right;">Page 19</p> <p>1 streetlights. There was a conversation where we<br/> 2 -- that I had brought to the table one time, that<br/> 3 we were thinking about maybe purchasing the<br/> 4 streetlights, because there's supposed to be some<br/> 5 financial, probably like, solar.<br/> 6 When you go and buy solar, right, you<br/> 7 got a little bit, you pay -- you're paying your<br/> 8 utility company supposedly less, and your solar,<br/> 9 you're obviously paying that off, but at a lesser<br/> 10 rate than you would be paying O&amp;R overall.<br/> 11 So, with all, we have 415 streetlights.<br/> 12 Most are the old sodium and older volt<br/> 13 technology. We do, obviously, have some LEDs.<br/> 14 But I found out that through, starts like, I<br/> 15 think, September-October, we'll get a letter, and<br/> 16 if we want to participate, O&amp;R will install for<br/> 17 free up to two percent or maybe a little bit,<br/> 18 that number moves a little bit, he said, but<br/> 19 they'll start to install all new LED lights<br/> 20 around the Village.<br/> 21 So, we're going to take advantage of<br/> 22 that. And this program I think has been around,<br/> 23 he said, since '17, 2017.
